CORRESPONDENCE

Mr. Editor:

I see by your last issue that N. R. N. has put in a reply to the article published in a previous issue on the second coming of Christ.

I find by reading down that N. R. N. says I erred, and in a brief way I will try and throw a little light on the subject. In the first place, N. R. N. says I am in error when I say that the church went into the wilderness in 570. The church was to be in the wilderness 1260 days (years), and I claim that in 1830 the church came out of the wilderness, it therefore follows that if the church came out of the wilderness in 1830 it must have gone into the wilderness on or about 570.

Again we further take notice that he says, I am equally in error when I say that the notable prophetic period begins in 570 and runs out in 1860. We find that just lately, "these last few years back" that the latter rains have returned to Jerusalem and that the Jews are returning back to their native land, "Jerusalem," and are commencing to rebuild their cities as in former times. Does this not fulfill the prophecy as given in Zech. 2, 1-5, it reads as follows: And I lifted up mine eyes again, and looked and behold a man with measuring line in his hand, then I said whither goest thou and he said unto me, to measure Jerusalem, to see what is the breadth thereof and what is the length thereof, and behold, the angel that talked with me went forth and another angel went out to meet him and said unto him, run speak to this young man saying, Jerusalem shall be inhabited as towns without walls, for the multitude of men and cattle therein, for I said the Lord will be unto her a wall of fire around about and will be the glory in the midst of her. Also read Isa. 52, 1-2, Isa. 60, 10-11; also Zech. 8, and many others which I could quote, all of these go to show that Jerusalem is to be re-peopled.

Again, N. R. N. is in error when he says that Christ will come at least two years before the resurrection of the just. We read in 1 Thes. 4, 14-18, For if we believe that Jesus died and rose again, even so them also which sleep in Jesus will be brought with him, for this we say unto you by the word of the Lord that which are alive and remain unto the coming of the Lord shall not prevent them which are asleep for the Lord himself shall descend from heaven with a shout, with the voice of the archangel, and with the trump of God, and the dead in Christ shall rise first. Then those who are alive and remain shall be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air, and so shall we ever be with the Lord, wherefore comfort one another with these words.

The above quotation goes to show that the saints (the righteous), that are here on this earth, will be caught up to meet Christ at his coming, and those (the righteous) that are in their graves, will hear his voice and will come forth to meet him at his coming, and reign on this earth during the millenium of one thousand years. Then comes the second resurrection when all shall be judged according to the deeds done in the body. Read Isa. 26, 19, John 5, 25, 28, 29, Rev. 20, 12-13. I can't see where N. R. N. finds that Christ is to come two years beforehand. It sounds like pure invention, for the Bible plainly teaches us that when Christ comes his saints will come with him.

Comparison of the Navies of the World.

Some interesting statistics have been compiled concerning the number and the types of the war vessels of the leading navies of the world. The tables show that England has, at the present time, some 43 battle ships, 12 coast defenders and 18 armored cruisers, and 10 battle ships building. The French navy contains 43 armored vessels built and 20 authorized and building. Russia has 40 such vessels, Germany 32 and Italy 18. These navies have, in addition, many unarmored vessels. The number of war vessels in the service of England, including protected cruisers, ordinary cruisers, gun-boats and torpedo vessels, exclusive of torpedo boats, is 238, and some 48 additional ones authorized and building. The French navy contains in all 147 vessels, with 24 building. Germany has altogether 39, Russia 32, and Italy 72. Torpedo boats have come to take a very important part in naval warfare. France has 217 torpedo boats in service and 42 authorized and building; England has 163 and 64 respectively; Italy 175 and 12; Russia 163 and 14, and Germany 119.

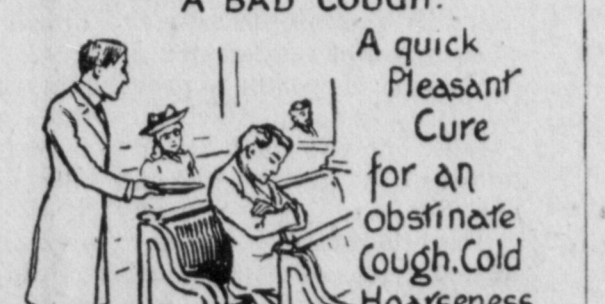

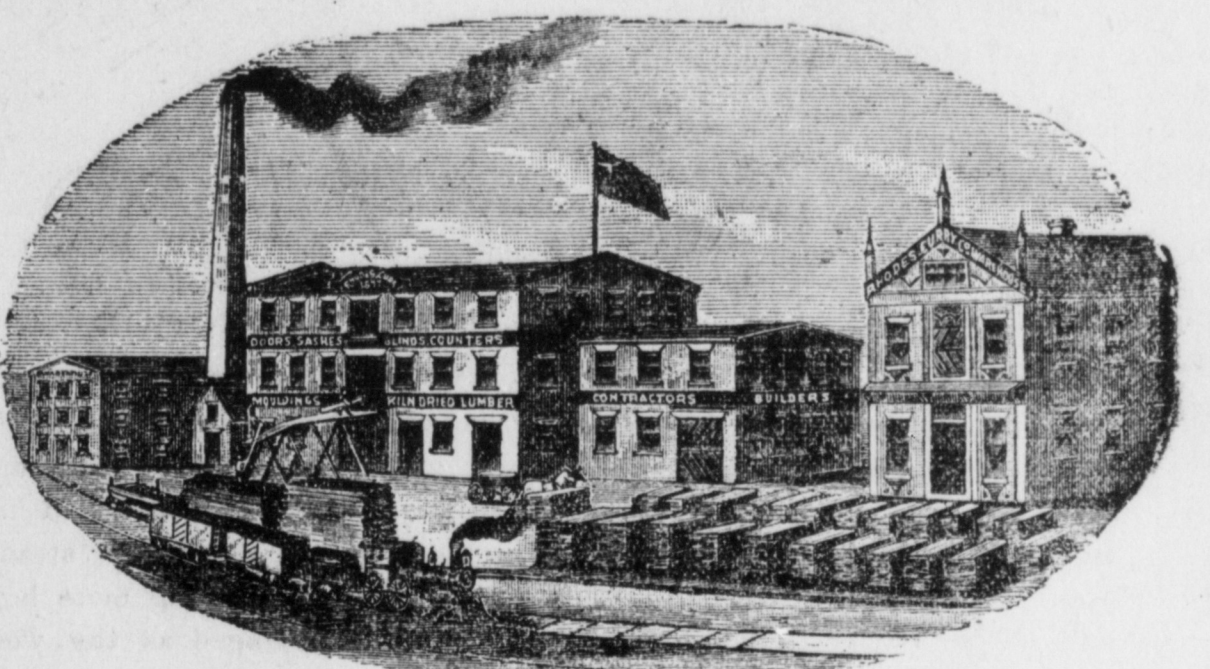

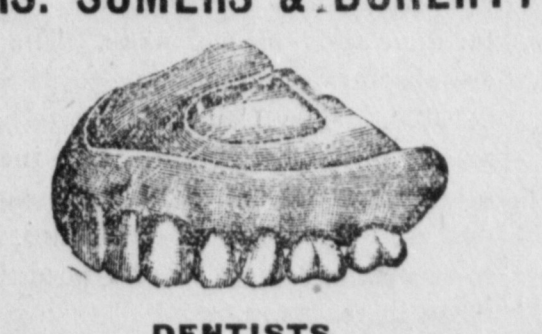
