

in error when I say that the church went into the wilderness in 570. The church was to be in the wilderness 1260 days (years), and I claim that in 1830 the church came out of the wilderness, it therefore follows that if the church came out of the wilderness in 1830 it must have gone into the wilderness on or about 570.

#### The Natural Bridge of Oregon.

One of the chief of the west coast natural curiosities is the "Titan Bridge," situated in Douglas County, Oregon, and about eighteen miles from Oakland. It is at the base between side walls, and the arch itself only lacks  $4\frac{1}{2}$  feet of being an even 100 above the little stream that runs beneath. The rock stratum which spans the canon and forms the bridge is 30 feet in thickness, exclusive of 3 or 4 feet of earth, which supports a few straggling trees. It has already become a great resort for Oregonian outers, and a large hotel on a plateau near the western approach of the bridge is among the near future probabilities .- St. Louis Republic.




