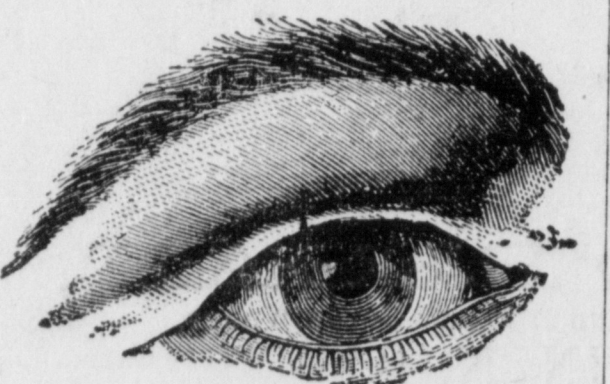

His Barbaric Highness.

GLASGOW, June 14.—All the arrangements were made for the Afghan prince, Nasrulla Khan, to visit and inspect the thread works of J. & P. Coats & Co., Paisley, and the shipbuilding yards in the Clyde to-day, but this morning Nasrulla positively refused to leave his bed in the hotel when he was aroused and informed that everything was in readiness for his coming.

An elaborate luncheon had been prepared and the large number of notable persons who had been invited, together with corporation officials, were awaiting the arrival of the Prince when they were notified that he was still in bed. A deputation of guests and officials proceeded to the hotel and finally induced his barbaric highness to get up and keep his engagement to inspect the shipbuilding yards, which he did.

The hour being so late the visit to the thread works was not made. Nasrulla acted in a similar manner in Liverpool, where he kept the guests waiting two hours on the occasion of his inspection of the electric railway in that city.

The visit of the Afghan Prince has cost the English and Indian taxpayers £50,000 but Nasrulla's only donation since his arrival in Great Britain has been a gift of £20,000 to the Moslem mosque in Liverpool.
