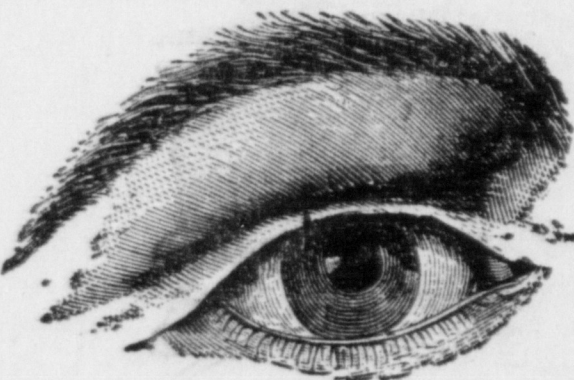

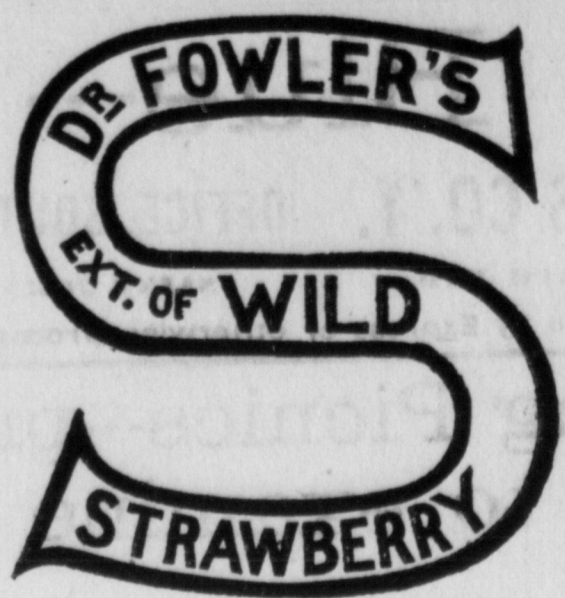

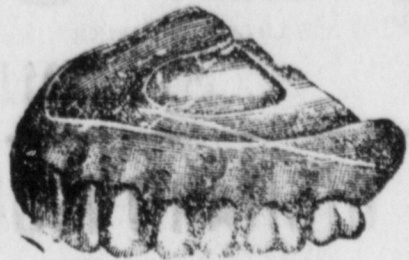

#### A Sure Remedy for Intemperance.

#### Korns. Korns.

#### Confederate Postage Stamps.

Persons who have kept any of the old letters they received from the south during the war might do well to look them over. The confederate government authorized the issue and use of local postage stamps, and nearly every city in the south at one time had its own stamp. Many thousands of those were used, but so rare are they now that they bring very high prices. There is among collectors a keen demand for them, and an idea of what they will bring may be gathered from the report of a sale which occurred recently at the rooms of the Philatelic Society, New York. Local confederate stamps sold as follows: Athens, Ga., \$49; four varieties of the Baton Rouge, La., 5 cent, \$41, \$77 and \$30 respectively; Macon, Ga., two varieties, for \$63.50 and \$171; Lenoir, N. C., \$82, and Mobile 2 cent, black, \$41.50. As time goes on these curiosities will probably increase in value. They are already beyond the reach of everybody but wealthy collectors.
