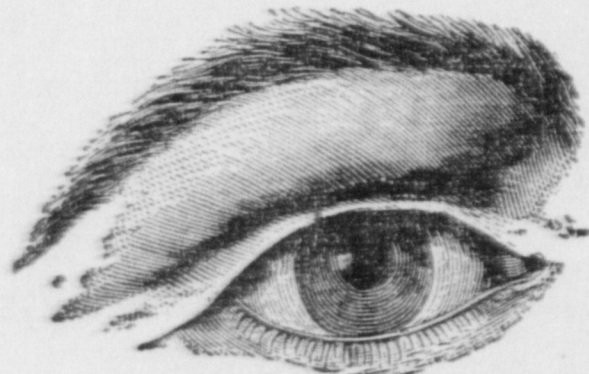

Oranges Shipped to Florida.
