## CORRESPONDENCE

Mr. Editor:

As the right of the farmers of this parish to build a cheese factory is being hotly disputed by a party of selfish merchants I would deem it a favor to be allowed space in your valuable paper to give the facts of the case.

Since the advantages of having a creamery in this parish were ably pointed out by Prof. Robertson two years ago, the possibility of building one has often been discussed. The merchants at one time contemplated building it but that idea was soon given up and so the matter stood.

A few weeks ago at a meeting called for the purpose, Michael McLaughlin, of Buctouche, proposed to build and have in operation a cheese factory, provided a sufficient number of cows be procured. This was agreed to by the farmers, and the cows having been guaranteed Mr. McLaughlin came down yesterday to complete his arrangements.

The mercantile faction knowing full well the injury such an establishment would cause to their business, became alarmed at the turn affairs had taken and at a private meeting decided upon the course they would pursue. This was to place every possible obstacle in their (the farmers) way with the intention of discouraging them. Failing to thwart them in that way, our high minded friends would take upon themselves the task of building the factory which they could then operate in a manner satisfactory to themselves at least, consequently everything that could be done to discourage the building of it such as getting our parish priest to use his influence against it, and many other ignoble devices.

But our farmers showed that they were not to be fooled in that way. With a determination worthy of their cause they surmounted all difficulties and at a mass meeting here yesterday showed how unanimous they were. A very heated and animated discussion took place between the contending factions. The farmers to a man were determined that Mr. McLaughlin should build a factory and that they would do their share. The little czars had become very angry and one was so infuriated that he declared they would build a factory in spite of the farmers or any one else, that they had "money for their backing," whereupon the farmers retorted that they had "cows for their backing." Things certainly looked hot for a time, and the result is that a certain saw mill owner has orders for material to build two cheese factories. Further developments are anxiously awaited.

The unanimity of the farmers in their cause will, it is generally believed, prevent the merchants from building, when they consider the case.

The factory will be large enough to permit of manufacturing butter as well as cheese and in addition a grist mill and store will be run in connection. It will be located on the post road near the north end of the bridge. With McLaughlin at its head is sufficient guarantee that it will be run satisfactorily to the farmers, he being a young man of much experience, trustworthy and obliging.

We heartily applaud their course our fellow-cen have taken and would say to them "let these people see that you can run your own affairs without any help from them."

## DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

### His Excellency's Speech from the Throne.

OTTAWA, April 18.—The Dominion Parliament was opened this afternoon, a large number of members being present. The following is His Excellency's speech: Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate,—Gentlemen of the House of Commons,—

It is with much satisfaction that I again have recourse to your advice and assistance in the administration of the affairs of the Dominion. By the sudden and lamented death of the late Right Hon. Sir John Thompson, Canada has sustained a grievous loss. The deep and heartfelt sympathy expressed by Her Most Gracious Majesty the Queen and the manifestations of sorrow with which the distressing intelligence was received throughout the empire as well as tokens of esteem and respect paid to the memory of the deceased statesman have been gratefully appreciated by the people of Canada.

Satisfactory assurances having been received from Her Majesty's government respecting the interpretation of certain clauses in the treaty of commerce with France, ratification will be exchanged as soon as the necessary legislation has been passed.

The recent action of the Imperial parliament enabling the various Australasian governments to enter into preferential trade relations with the other self-governing colonies of the Empire affords gratifying proof that the suggestions of the Colonial Conference are being favorably entertained by Her Majesty's government.

In conformation with a recent judgment of the Lords of the judicial committee of the Privy Council to the effect that the dissenting minority of the province of Manitoba have constitutional right to appeal to the Governor General-in-Council against certain acts passed by the Legislature of the Province of Manitoba, in relation to the subject of education, I have heard in council the appeal and my decision thereon has been communicated to the legislature of that province. The papers on the subject will be laid before you.

The depression in trade which has prevailed throughout the world for the past few years has made itself felt in Canada, but fortunately to a less degree than in other countries. Although this has not resulted in any considerable decrease in the volume of our foreign trade, yet owing to low prices and recent reduction in and removal of taxation, it has been followed by a serious decrease in revenue derived from customs and excise.

In order to produce equilibrium between revenue and expenditure for the coming year it will be necessary to obtain the greatest economy in the appropriations for the various branches of the public service.

During the period that has elapsed since the last session of parliament I have had the opportunity of visiting many parts of the Dominion, including the Maritime Provinces, Manitoba, the Northwest Territories and British Columbia. Throughout these tours I have been impressed and gratified by manifestations of abounding loyalty and public spirit and notwithstanding the phase of trade depression already referred to, I observed everywhere unmistakable signs of the confident hopefulness in the future based on a thorough belief in the greatness of the resources of Canada, which is one of the characteristics of the people, and which furnishes a good augury and pledge of further development and progress.

The government of Newfoundland having intimated its desire to renew negotiations looking to the admission of that colony into the Dominion of Canada, a sub-committee of my advisers have recently met in conference a delegation from the Island government and discussed with them the terms of union. It will be a subject of general congratulation if the negotiations now pending result in the incorporation of Her Majesty's oldest colonial possession into the Canadian confederation.

A measure relating to bankruptcy and insolvency and to joint stock companies will be laid before you. You will also be asked to consider certain amendments to the insurance act, to the act respecting dominion notes, to the Dominion lands act, to the Indian act, to the Northwest Territories representation act, also a bill respecting the land subsidy of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,—

I have directed that the accounts of the past year shall be laid before you. The estimates for the ensuing year will also be presented. They have been framed with every regard to economy, compatible with the efficiency of the public services.

Honorable Gentlemen of the Senate,—Gentlemen of the House of Commons,—

I now leave you to the discharge of the important duties devolving upon you with an earnest prayer that being guided by the spirit of wisdom and patriotism your deliberations may, under the divine blessing, conduce to the unity and well being of Canada.

## The Date for Easter.

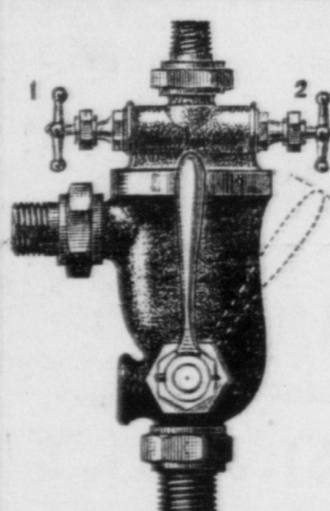
"Thirty days hath September,"
