Human Storage of Caloric.

There is some danger to the novice in going into semi-tropical regions in being unacquainted with and unprepared for the degree of apparent cold which he is likely to find to his great surprise. And when he looks at the thermometer he is further surprised to see it so high while his feelings indicate a much lower temperature. He is still more astonished to notice that the natives do not mind the cold that makes the novice shiver. The fact is that without his accustomed fire and housewarming facilities, subjected to air currents, the practical temperature in its physiological effects is much lower than the thermometer registers. In Spain, Italy, and in general along the Mediterranean shore, they have a semi-tropical climate, during eight or nine months of the year, during which time the native inhabitants held their calorific function in reserve, and when they reach their short and moderately cold season they have no difficulty in drawing sufficiently on their reserve heat-making power. The man from the north has no such reserve, and what he has the temperature is not sufficiently stimulating to call into full activity. He has used up his caloric in the greater cold of the north. People from the extreme south enjoy their first northern winter. I met, in Teneriffe, an intelligent captain of a whaling ship, who had several times fished in the Behring Sea. He said that it was customary for the whalers to make up for loss of men from desertion by taking on South Sea Islanders. He said they bore the cold and hardships of the north as well as New Bedford whalers, and in proof related the following incident: One morning, when far north, he noticed on coming on deck one of his South Sea Islanders, naked, taking a bath. There was a strong wind blowing, and it was so cold that the water he dashed over him froze as it struck the deck. The man seemed to enjoy it, though he had never seen frozen water or snow before. There are good reasons why people of the north with impaired stamina should not expect to bear exposure so well as natives of semi-tropical regions, and should make themselves, in regard to temperature, more comfortable than would be sufficient for the natives.—The Popular Science Monthly.

When Should a Man Swear?

Man is not only a reasoning but a swearing animal. Sometimes his feelings are expressed audibly and at others they are so deep down in his nature that nothing less than a volcano would thrust them to the surface. If man should swear at all, when should that time be? The church is silent on this important matter and the law gives no sanction to cuss words. Hygiene of the Eyes.

The preservation of the eye-sight is a matter of the utmost importance to the individual as well as to society. We commend especially the following rules, by Dr. L. W. Fox, Professor of Ophthalmology, Medico-Chirurgical College, Philadelphia:

1. Avoid sudden changes from dark to brilliant light.
2. Avoid the use of stimulants and drugs which affect the nervous system.
3. Avoid reading when lying down, or when mentally or physically exhausted.
4. When the eyes feel tired, rest them by looking at objects at a long distance.
5. Pay special attention to the hygiene of the body, for that which tends to promote the general health acts beneficially upon the eye.
6. Up to forty years of age, bathe the eyes twice daily in cold water.
7. After fifty, bathe the eyes morning and evening with water so hot that you wonder how you stand it; follow this with cold water, that will make them glow with warmth.
8. Old persons should avoid reading much by artificial light, be guided as to diet, and avoid sitting up late at night.
9. Do not depend on your own judgment in selecting spectacles.
10. Do not give up in despair when you are informed that a cataract is developing; remember that in these days of advancing surgery it can be removed with little danger to the vision.

Remarkable Lakes in British Columbia.

Little Shuswap Lake is stated to have a flat bottom, with a depth varying from 58 to 74 feet, measured from the mean high water mark. The deepest water found in the Great Shuswap was 555 feet, about six miles northward from Cinnemousun Narrows, in Seymour Arm, though the whole lake is notably deep. Adams Lake, however, exceeds either of the Shuswaps, as its average depth for twenty miles is upwards of 1,100 feet, and at one point a depth of 1,900 feet was recorded. In the northwest corner of this lake, at a depth of 1,118 feet, the purpose of the scientific explorers was defeated by the presence of mysterious submarine currents, which played with the sounding line like some giant fish and prevented any measurement being taken. It is a complete mystery how the currents could have been started at this depth, and scientific curiosity will no doubt impel either public or private enterprise to send a second expedition to the scene this summer to endeavour to solve the riddle. As the height of the surface of this lake is 1,380 feet above the sea level, its present bed is, therefore, only 190 feet above the sea, although distant 200 miles from the nearest part of the ocean. Dr. Dawson and his associates believe that the beds of some of the mountain lakes in the region are many feet lower than the sea level.—Vancouver World.

The Enormous Sun, Arcturus.

If the earth were situated midway between the sun and Arcturus, it would receive 5,198 times as much light from that star as it would from the sun. It is quite probable, moreover, that the heat of Arcturus exceeds the solar heat in the same ratio, for the spectroscopic shows that, although Arcturus is surrounded with a cloak of metallic vapors proportionately far more extensive than the sun's, yet, smothered as the great star seems in some respects to be, it rivals Sirius itself in the intensity of its radiant energy.

If we suppose the radiation of Arcturus to be the same per unit of surface as the sun's it follows that Arcturus exceeds the sun about 376,000 times in volume, and that its diameter is no less than 62,350,000 miles. Imagine the earth and the other planets constituting the solar system removed to Arcturus and set revolving around it in orbits of the same forms and sizes as those in which they circle about the sun. Poor Mercury! For that little planet it would indeed be out of the frying pan into the fire, because as it rushed to perihelion, Mercury would plunge more than 3,500,000 miles beneath the surface of the giant star. Venus and the earth would perhaps melt like snow flakes at the mouth of a furnace. Even far away Neptune the remotest member of the system, would be bathed in torrid heat.—Popular Science Monthly.
