He had only enough money to provide him with necessities on the journey and intended to live with an uncle in Boston while looking for work. He went out of here on Wednesday night's train, but at Vanceboro was stopped by the American immigration agent, who sent him home because he had not \$35. That sum every foreigner entering Uncle Sam's territory is expected to have. The C. P. R. brought the lad back to this city, but having neither ticket or money he could not continue his journey home to Newcastle. The railway authorities will collect for him the money due on the unused portion of his Boston ticket. Vaughan is only one of a number of passengers who have been sent back from Vanceboro during the past week or so. The law is likely to work many hardships and to seriously interfere with traffic. It is said that if provincialists residing in the States who come here for their holidays do not save \$35 to show the officers on their return they will be denied admittance. Such certainly is not the spirit of the law, for the only object can be to keep out of the country those who are likely to become a public charge.—Globe.

Miss Anna Phinney left for Truro on Wednesday, to spend the summer.

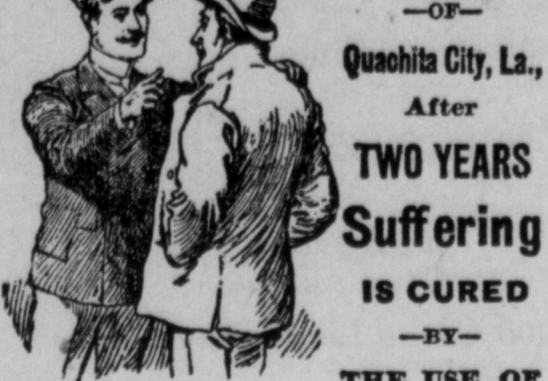

—A public meeting of the parishioners of St. Marys Episcopal church, will be held in the parish church, on Saturday, the 6th day of July next, at 7 p. m., for the election of a Rector for said church.

—Mr. A. K. Neales, formerly a lawyer in Chatham, but now in Los Angeles, is seriously ill. He went West two years ago for the benefit of his health. Mr. Neales was at one time principal of the Dorchester Grammar School.

—At the annual meeting of the Associated Alumni Society of the University of New Brunswick, Frank Allen of the senior class was awarded the Alumni gold medal for the best Latin translation. Frank is a son of Rev. J. S. Allen.

—Some idea of the number of provincialists in the United States may be gained from the fact that one day last week five caskets came in on the C. P. R. to St. John containing the remains of natives of this country who had died in the neighboring republic.

—Mr. Geo. A. Day, C. E., of St. John, was surveying the Albion channel last week for the purpose of locating the dredge, which will probably be sent here as soon as Mr. Day sends in his report. He found the channel in a much better condition than was expected.

—It is expected that the Rev. Adam Currie, of Bays Islands, Newfoundland, will occupy the pulpit in St. Marys Episcopal church, Richibucto, Sunday, 9th inst. Mr. Currie is an applicant for the rectorship lately made vacant by the resignation of the Rev. H. Hackenley.

—The creameries of Buctouche and Memramcook are in operation and about 4000 lbs of milk is taken every morning by each factory. There is a fair prospect that the quantity will be doubled during the present month. The Cocagne factory opens soon. All these factories are under the management of Mr. Michael McLaughlin.

—The body of Martha Roache, the little girl who strayed from her home near Sydney six months ago was found Monday in the woods. Five hundred men searched for her at the time of her disappearance without result. She missed her way going back home after buying a few cents worth of candy in a neighboring store.

—Thos. C. Burns' steam saw mill at Kingston was destroyed by fire early Saturday morning. When discovered the flames had gained such headway that it was impossible to check them. Much sympathy is felt for Mr. Burns, this being the second time his mill has been consumed by the fiery element within two years. No insurance. Mr. Burns will rebuild at once.

—The United States officials recently enacted a law which prevents persons passing the border who cannot show \$35 in cash. Several persons have been refused admission into the alleged land of the free at Vanceboro because they could not produce the requisite amount of change. If the reader thinks of exuding he should see that he has the proper amount of cash. The new regulation applies with equal force to natives of this country, now living in the U. S., returning from a visit to their friends here.

—Mr. James F. Atkinson, who was in town Sunday, accompanied by Mrs. Atkinson, received word by telephone that his residence at McLeod Mills had been completely destroyed by fire early in the morning. A very strong wind was blowing at the time giving the fire such headway that but a small portion of the furniture was saved. Adjoining buildings were saved with difficulty. Mr. Atkinson removed from town but a few weeks ago, and had hardly got settled in his new home. His many friends will be sorry to hear of his loss.

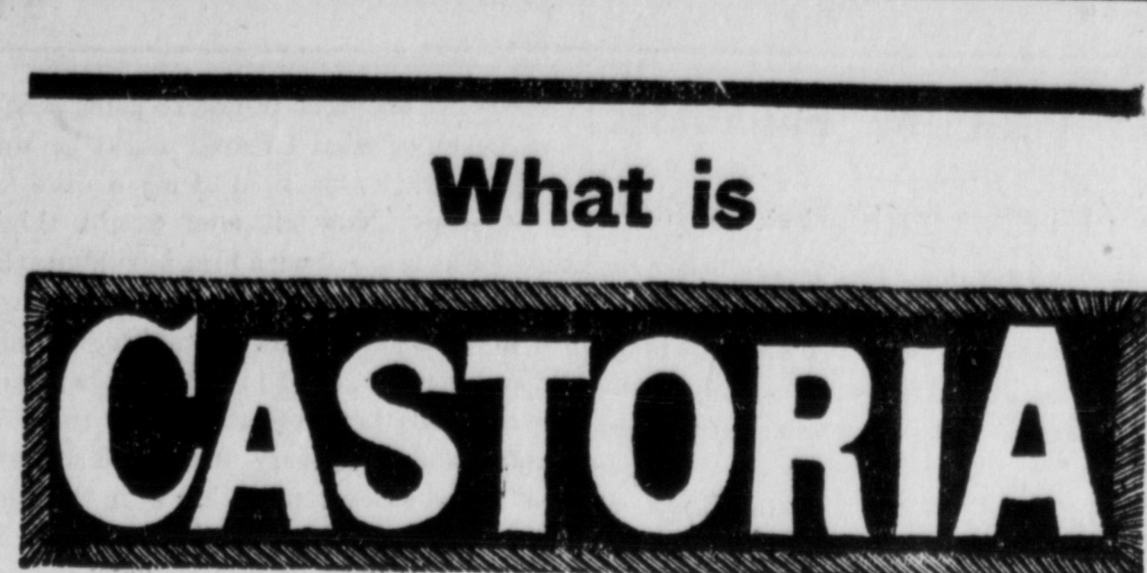
