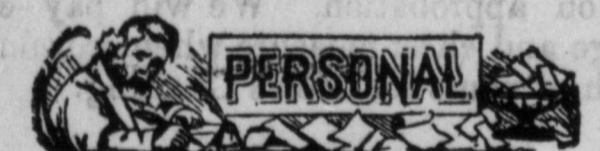

—Mackerel are being taken in considerable quantities and the season gives promise of being a good one. They are unusually large and fat.

—One of the vacancies for New Brunswick in the Senate has been filled by the appointment of George T. Baird, Esq., of Andover. The new senator is in his 58th year.

—It is understood that the business of the St. Lawrence Lumber company, controlled by the late Senator Burns, will be continued by the liquidators, W. H. Thorne and Richard Turner.

—Purves' steam saw mill, (better known as Stetson's,) St. John, was burned to the ground between 3 and 4 o'clock Friday morning. The lumber in the vicinity of the mill was saved. The mill was valued at \$30,000. There was only \$8,000 insurance.

—Charles Glover, of Campbellton, N. B., who was abducted and taken to Toronto by MacDermott, the tramp, there abused and forced to beg, is dead. After being taken back to his home at Campbellton, from the Toronto hospital, he never recovered.

—W. H. Lively who had been writing some nasty notes about Kingston citizens to a Moncton paper, over a forged signature, got wind that the boys were to give him a coat of tar and feathers, and he stole off in the darkness and dead of night on Friday last. Present whereabouts unknown. When last seen he was hounding it in the direction of Winnipeg.

—Our vigilant constables have not as yet succeeded in taking the body of James E. Thompson, proprietor of the Queen Hotel. That individual publicly boasts that he sells, and will continue to sell, liquor in defiance of the authorities. Thompson applied for a license at the January session of the County Council, but as there was a fine of \$50 standing against him for illegal liquor selling, it was not granted.

—We understand that the Miramichi Telephone Company are about to remove their instruments from Kent Co. During the last two years, from different causes, one by one subscribers have dropped out, until now they have dwindled down to such a diminutive number that the plant has become a debt maker. Naturally the Company are disgusted, but they say this: Give us five new subscribers and we will continue the business and give you a good service. This we think should be a call to all patriotic men. Let every man that resides in the vicinity of Richibucto and Kingston, who considers himself anybody put forth every effort to save the life of the telephone. Outsiders claim that this section of Kent is going behindhand. Let the telephone go and we will accept this as proof positive that we are away behind "Canada's time."

### The Turf.

The Moncton Driving Park Association, who have leased the park for the present season, will hold their initiatory meeting on July 6th.

The events will be a running race (handicap) for a purse of \$100; a 240 class trotting for a purse of \$100 and a named race, trotting and pacing for a purse of \$50. There will also be a two mile and a one mile bicycle race, the prizes being a silver cup and a gold medal respectively.
