Three Men Fall Three Stories.

One of the four half-inch wire cables used to draw up the freight elevator in the stable at No. 140 East Twenty-fifth street, New York, snapped last night and the elevator fell from the top floor to the ground with its load of three men.

The stable is three stories high and is the property of P. K. Egan, No. 241 East Thirty-fifth street. He came around to the stable last night to superintend the hoisting of a hansom cab to the third floor. Egan and two employees, Patrick Farrelly of No. 303 East Forty-sixth street, had John Malloy, of No. 357 West Thirty-seventh street had succeeded in removing the vehicle from the ground to the top floor and then got on the elevator to be lowered. As soon as the lift began to descend one of the cables broke.

Egan was badly hurt about the hands and knees and removed to his home in a carriage. Farrelly's left leg was fractured, and Malloy was bruised about the body. Both were sent to Bellevue Hospital in an ambulance by Policeman Donlin, of the East Twenty-second Street Station.
