AT THE WORLD'S FAIR

Church of England Parish Meeting.

RICHIBUCTO, April 16th, 1895.—At the annual Easter meeting held in the parish church, Monday, the following officers were appointed for the ensuing year:—Wm. Hudson and W. A. P. Rhodes, wardens; C. J. Sayre, A. Hains, John Stevenson, D. Percy, Fred S. Sayre, Fred Hannah, Joseph Michaud, R. Cochrane, Wm. Perry, Jr., David Palmer, Jonathan Forster and Thomas Dickinson, vestrymen; A. Hains, treasurer; W. A. P. Rhodes, collector; Wm. Hudson and J. Stevenson, lay delegates to synod and D. C. S.; Wm. Dickinson and Fred S. Sayre, substitutes; W. A. P. Rhodes, sexton for Kingston; Miss Hudson, organist for Richibucto; Fred S. Sayre, vestry clerk. The finances of the parish were found to be in a prosperous state, which will no doubt be pleasing to all subscribers. The Rev. H. Hackenley having resigned his charge of the parish to take effect the last of this month, the parish then becomes vacant and for a short time no doubt we will be without a minister. During such time it is thought advisable to have some much needed repairs and alterations made to the church, which, it is hoped, will be carried out. The following resolution was unanimously passed and presented to Mr. Hackenley:

Whereas the Rev. Henry Hackenley Rector of St. Mary's Church in the parish of Richibucto has signified his intention of resigning the charge which he has so acceptably filled for the past five years. And whereas ever since his induction to the charge of the parish we have recognized in Mr. Hackenley a complete devotion to the interests of his church and a kind and courteous christian conduct in every day life among all with whom he has been brought in contact. And whereas he has always evinced sound Evangelical teaching in the church and ever shown his firm attachment to the good old ways of the reformed church of England, and has given in his practices in the services of the sanctuary full evidence of his determination to give no sign of encouragement to the errors of faith and practise which have crept into the church in many places in the present day. And whereas he has while showing at all times a general liberality of sentiment and conduct to all denominations of christians in the community honestly and courteously maintained the formulae and ceremonies of his own church and faithfully preached his pure doctrines from the pulpit.

Therefore Resolved that we accept such resignation with much sorrow and regret and cannot allow this opportunity now afforded at the annual regular Easter meeting of the congregation to pass without expressing our sense of the great loss the church will sustain when the Reverend gentleman's connection with it shall be severed.

And we express the earnest prayer that wherever his lot shall be cast in the years to come, he will continue in God's blessing and that his future time may be passed in health, happiness and prosperity. And further resolved that this resolution be placed on the records of the "Church Corporation," and a copy thereof be furnished to Mr. Hackenley by the vestry clerk.

Mr. Hackenley in reply expressed his surprise and pleasure at so unexpected an indorsement of his work in the parish and church and thanked the meeting for their kind words as expressed in the resolution, and said that wherever his lot might be cast he would always look back with tender feelings upon Richibucto and its people. He also spoke feelingly of the sore bereavement he had sustained in the loss of his wife since his coming to the parish.

Notes From the Clyde.

The yachting season will soon be opening again on the Clyde. This year bids fair to surpass all former ones. All the yards are very busy just now getting the boats ready, refitting old ones and putting the finishing touches on the new. The new boat, Ailsa, designed by Fife of Fairlie, has been giving a very good account of herself in the Mediterranean Ryalto. In her maiden race she beat the Britannia in light weather and since then has won several more races. There seems little doubt that she is a faster boat than the Britannia in light weather, and even in heavy weather with housed topmast and reefs in she has beaten the old champion.

Fife has certainly made a hit this time. His last big boat, the Calluna, built for a syndicate of Glasgow gentlemen was a failure, but he has retrieved his honors in the Ailsa. In Henderson's yard there is at present being built the Valkyrie No 3, to Watson's design, and speculation is rife as to whether or not she will be able to hold her own with the Ailsa. If she can beat her the prospects of winning the cup from the Yankees will be bright. If the Ailsa proves the better of the two she will be the one selected to cross the Atlantic.

The Vigilant is still on this side and she will in all probability take part in the Clyde regatta. She is to be sailed by an old Clyde man and I have heard it asserted by a Clyde yachtsman that if she had been properly handled last year she would have beaten the Britannia. The truth of that assertion will be tested in July as her present Commander is an exceptionally good man. The Satinista, Britannia, Ailsa, new Valkyrie and Vigilant all racing together should prove a spectacle worth travelling a long distance to see.

The Americans seem to have come to the conclusion that the centre board is not equal to the keel for large boats. The Britannia-Vigilant races of last year seem to have proved this, but one cannot help thinking that it would be wiser on the part of the defenders of the Queen's Cup to stick to the style of boat they have been accustomed to rather than try a new design of which they have practically had little experience. Of course if their new keeled boat does not prove as fast as some of their centreboards, one of them may be substituted. After the Clyde regatta experts will be able to form a fair idea of the chances of the cup once more crossing the Atlantic.

Blinded by Lightning.

"In the summer of 1887 I saw a young man blinded by a flash of lightning," said Charles Gerhardt, of Fort Wayne, Ind., at the Laclede. "It was the most singular accident I ever heard of, and while I am no wise sentimental or religiously inclined, I have always felt that it was a judgment sent upon him. He was the most profane man I ever knew and at times he became sacrilegious. I am no church member, but something within me made me fairly cringe when he uttered some of his terrible oaths. Will Wagner was his name. The accident happened one afternoon on the Tippecanoe River. A party of us were making a canoe cruise down the river, hunting and fishing as we went, and but for Wagner's mishap, it would always have stood out in memory as one of the happiest periods of my life.

"A fearful thunderstorm came up about noon and we ran in at a bend shaded by heavy timber a few miles above Buffalo, a village of not more than twenty houses. We drew the awnings tightly over our boats, donned our mackintoshes and started out to spend the time fishing at the rapids below, as we could not make much headway in the rain. Wagner was standing on the bank, and the steady downpour made fishing poor sport. It was the wildest place I was ever in. Great forked tongues of lightning burst from the dark and lowering clouds momentarily and darted across the sky or down to earth. I could see the horizon on every side, even through the naked woods in front of us. Every now and then great balls of fire would strike the ground and roll along for some distance. The storm seemed to get worse and I became frightened. Wagner stood on the bank cursing and swearing because he could not get a bite. Finally I said to him: 'Billy, don't swear that way; it don't do you any good.' At this he laughed heartily and launched a terrible oath at me. Just then the lightning struck a tall tree not 100 yards away with a terrible crash. We all felt the shock and commented on how close the tree was, and how the lightning burned and blackened it.

"But a moment later we were all frightened half out of our senses when Wagner cried in a tone of anguish, 'Come here, quick, Dan; I can't see.' We all ran to him, and Dan Meizer caught him as he reeled and fell. He was unconscious over an hour. The doctor at Buffalo said he was only temporarily blinded. We drove over to the station and Dan took him home on the first train. He never experienced the slightest pain, and external appearances would not reveal that his eyes had been injured, but the sight is gone forever."

The Popular Emperor of Japan.

No wonder the Japanese fight with spirit in their Emperor's cause, having such a man to rule over them as is described in the following quotation from the Tokio Sun: "Since the beginning of the war H. I. M. the Emperor has been very much concerned on account of the privations that his loyal armies have been suffering. Since his arrival at the general headquarters in Hiroshima, he has been attending from morning till late at night to the onerous duty of conducting military operations in Korea and China. He does not waste a moment, denying himself even exercise after meals. In this way he has been sharing the sufferings of his soldiers in the field. It is said that on January 1, when the nobles and high officials waited on him to present their New Year's congratulations, his Majesty ordered one of the chamberlains to bring him a suit of clothes similar to that worn by the soldiers of second rank. This he put on himself, and thus attired, walked about the garden for some hours until he felt almost frozen. Turning around to his attendants he said: 'The sufferings of our loyal armies are beyond our imagination. May every effort be made to lighten their hardships.' These words may convey an idea of no deep significance to other nationalities, but to the Japanese such heartfelt words of sympathy from the throne are enough to redouble the spirit of patriotism and the enthusiasm to fight in their Emperor's cause. Love of country plus the feeling of loyalty constitute the true Japanese patriotism."—Chicago Tribune.
