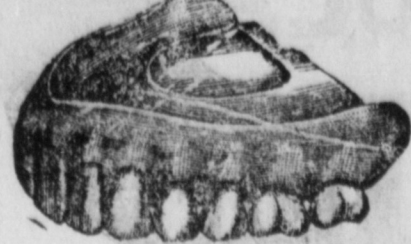

# GENERAL NEWS.

The ratification of the Franco-Canadian treaty, it is said in Paris, is held in abeyance pending the Dominion's legislation on certain points involving the "most favored nation" provision.

Sir Henry James has introduced in the House of Commons a bill imposing a penalty for the utterance of any false statement regarding the character or conduct of any candidate for election to Parliament.

John Cass and Alex. Keating on trial for manslaughter, in connection with the death of a farmer, Johnson, at Guelph last November, have been acquitted at the assizes being held in the place named. Judge Ross directed that a verdict of "not guilty" be entered.

Wm. Hogan, one of the oldest residents of Moncton, died on the 10th inst., at the residence of his son, Dennis Hogan. Deceased was 100 years old. Born in Cork he came to this country 75 years ago, and was one of Moncton's first settlers. Deceased was totally blind the last 35 years.

Saturday morning some farmers about Penobscus station in the Parish of Cardwell, Kings Co., were horrified to find the dead body of a man in a field near that place. Upon examination it was found that the remains were those of a constable named McKinley, of New Ireland, Albert county.

Mr. George Robertson becomes Mayor of St. John another year without having to run an election. This is just such appreciation as should be shown for the manner in which he has discharged his duties the past year; a compliment to the man and matter upon which the city can be congratulated.—Globe.

Peter Fitzpatrick, an employee of the Dwyer Leather Manufacturing Company, No. 76 Ferguson street, Newark, attempted yesterday to cross a vat in the tan-yard on which a plank was lying. The vat was filled with boiling water and tankard the steam from which made the plank wet and slippery. Fitzpatrick fell into the vat and was almost submerged. His screams brought his fellow workmen to his aid and they dragged him out. They attempted to take of his clothing, but big strips of flesh came with it. Fitzpatrick was taken to St. Michael's Hospital, nearly three miles distant, although the closest to the place of the accident. The horse was galloped the entire distance as if it was a race of life and death. At the hospital the doctors expressed surprise that Fitzpatrick was alive. They said his injuries would probably prove fatal.

Love of horse trading came very near causing the death of Robert Cillis, a well known young farmer of Sherbrooke, Ont., last week. Cillis, who had come to town early Saturday morning with a pair of fine young colts, was met by a party of horse traders, who wanted to swap horses. As they offered very little Cillis would not trade. They inveigled him into a bar and plied him with beer until they got him in an almost insensible condition, when they did with him what they pleased. A trade was made, and Cillis started for home. Hardly had he reached there when he was taken violently sick. Dr. Camirand, who was called, diagnosed the case as one of poisoning. What is commonly known as knock-out drops were used by the traders to render Cillis insensible. On Sunday afternoon the victim had recovered sufficiently to tell the above story. The guilty parties are closely watched by the police.

Among the pupils of the New York dramatic schools of whom great hopes are entertained, the World mentions a Canadian young lady, Miss Mary Anglin, and gives the following sketch: Mary Anglin, or Margaret Moore, as she will be called on the stage, was born in St. John, New Brunswick, in 1876, and is a daughter of the Hon. T. Warren Anglin, formerly speaker of the house of commons, Ottawa. Miss Anglin for many years was a prominent figure in Canadian society, and the announcement that she was going to become an actress was at first received with incredulity. A girl with money and good looks and a father holding an office under the crown is hardly likely to avoid making a brilliant match, and Miss Anglin in fact was surrounded by admirers. But her love for the stage proved stronger than her love for fashion, and much to her father's anger, she came to New York to undergo the necessary course of study, entering the Empire Dramatic school last fall. Miss Anglin is a blonde of medium height. She has blue eyes, a good nose and mouth, and a well shaped head. She is graceful, and has a rich and sympathetic voice. She was educated at the Sacred Heart Convent, Montreal.
