DIMENSIONS OF THE UNIVERSE.

It Takes a Thousand Years for the Light of Some Stars to Reach Us.

While, however, it is interesting to know the distance of some of the stars in miles, when stated in that way the numbers are so large that they frequently convey very indistinct conceptions to the mind. For this reason it is customary to estimate star distances in "light years." A light year is the distance that light, moving at the rate of 186,300 miles per second, travels in one year. This amounts in round numbers to 5,880,000,000,000 miles. The distance of Alpha Centauri is 4.35 light years; that of Sirius, the Dog Star, is almost exactly twice as great, or 8.6 light years. In other words light requires 8.6 years to come to us from Sirius. And these are among the very nearest of the stars. Some, whose parallaxes have been rather estimated than measured, appear to be situated at a distance which light could not traverse in less than one or two centuries. The great star Arcturus, for instance, has, according to Dr. Elkin, a parallax of only eighteen one-thousandths of a second. Its distance must in that case, be about 181 light years, or more than a thousand million million miles. And if its distance is so great then since light varies inversely as the square of the distance from its source, it can be shown that Arcturus must actually give forth 5,000 to 6,000 times as much light as the sun yields.

Yet Arcturus is evidently much nearer than the vast majority of the stars are. Not one in a million is known to have a parallax large enough even to be intelligently guessed at. There may be stars whose light requires thousands instead of hundreds of years to cross the space separating them from us.

We thus see that only a few points on the nearer shores of the starry universe lies within reach of our measurements; here and there a jutting headland, while behind stretches the vast expanse over which the hundreds of millions of stars known to exist are scattered.—G. P. Serviss in the Chautauquan.

HOLMES, THE SLAYER.

Mrs. Peltzel Says "She can see it all now."

CHICAGO, July 26.—I. L. Connor, the husband of Julia F. Connor and the father of Pearl Connor, both of whom are thought to be murdered by Holmes, was in Chicago last night. He says he has no positive proof that Holmes killed his wife and child, but says he believes such to be the case. He does not know when the crime was committed, but thinks it was done in this city.

Mrs. Peltzel talked more freely of Holmes last night than any time since she returned from Toronto. She is firmly convinced that it was Holmes' intention to murder her.

"I can see it all now" she said. I can see why Holmes murdered Minnie Williams and Mrs. Connor, why he has done away with all my family and my two children. The miserable wretch only wanted to cover up his infamous tracks. I may be thankful I am sitting here today and that my two children are not in their graves."

"Do you think you had a narrow escape from death at his hands at the house in Burlington?"

"Yes. I am confident that he intended me to meet the same fate then as my husband and my babies met."

"Did you know much of your husband's affairs?"

"No; he told me little of them. I knew hardly anything of the building that Holmes built. When we came to Chicago we lived the first year and most of the second a happy life. My husband was a carpenter and had plenty of work to do.

I had been at my home while my husband was away. I had been in bad health. The coming to Chicago did me good. My husband drank very little before he met Holmes. After that I noticed he seemed to drink a good deal."

The most important discovery made today at the Central station was the disclosure of the identity of the expressman who is supposed to have done the trucking for Holmes. He lives in the neighborhood and pending his examination by the detectives, the department refuses to reveal his name.

It is claimed this man was accustomed to visit the flat late at night or very early in the morning. This was at a time when Holmes' troubles were the greatest and he was dividing his time between causing women to disappear and robbing all manner of creditors.

William Capps of the firm of Capps and Cantee of Fort Worth, Texas, is in Chicago in the interest of the heirs of the Williams sisters. He has obtained copies of the deeds by which they transferred the property and he claims that their names were forged.

The evidence has been collected, he says, which will prove conclusively that the girls were murdered before July 12, the date appended to the deeds. He thinks they were put out of the way before July 4. He has been investigating the property at Wilmette and says that it is still in the name of Minnie Williams.

CHICAGO, July 26.—Thomas Freeman, agent for the Chicago Demonstrators association said last night, that, in his opinion, the bones found in the Holmes "Castle" in Englewood were those of persons made away with on the premises or else those were bodies that had been shipped to Chicago.

He said that all the bodies of the pauper dead in the county passed through his hands and that it would have been impossible for Holmes to have obtained a cadaver without his knowledge.

CHICAGO, July 26.—Geo. W. Harris, alias B. F. Ziegel, is in custody of detective agency under suspicion of being a confederate of H. H. Holmes in his insurance swindles. Harris has passed under a string of aliases, having been also known as B. A. Simpkins and Alfred H. Post. He was chief promoter in the Taylor addition first mortgage swindle in St. Paul which caught many Chicago people.

Much importance is attached to the arrest of Harris, as it is believed by the police and detective agency which have him in charge, that if they can run people who were associated with Holmes in his insurance scandal they will find those who can tell of the murders which it is supposed Holmes has committed.
