RICHIBUCTO, N. B., JAN. 10, 1895 DISCOLORED LOBSTERS.

It has been generally supposed by our fish packers that discoloration of canned lobsters is caused by a too free use of acid in sealing the cans. Those who have not single can of lobsters by discoloration. It would appear, however, that blackened cans may result from other causes. The Canadian Department of Marine and Fishing Gazette thus notes the conclusions reached in the matter:

Sir Charles Tupper, Canada's high commissioner in London, having directed the attention of the Canadian fisheries department to the master, Sir Hibbert Tupper, Minister of Marine and Fisheries, instructed Prof. Prince, the fisheries commissioner t) investigate and report. This report has been submitted. It shows that owing to the great increase of discolored tins have dropped the business, and others reduced their purchases of Canadian canned lobsters. The industry is therefore seriously threatened.

It is noted that the increase in discolored tins has come about since undersized lobster packing has been resorted to, and illegal packing in July and August, as few years ago, when only mature lobsters were canned and put up in the proper

Dr. Wakeham's suggestion of possible causes of discoloration are referred to in the report. They are: (1) Packing in (2) Bad and imperfect sealing by fishermen. (3) Use of some new chemical in in sealing up; and inferior tin bought by small packers.

Prof. Prince's investigations do not warrant him in accepting either or all of these as the explanation, but he thinks that there is every evidence that the cause of mischief is in the meat itself, the contents of the tin. Nor does he accept the bacilli theory, in discussing which refer-The true cause, Prof. Prince thinks, is chemical and due to the condition and sulphur in the blackened tins, and thing about that. these chemical matters are precisely those richly present in undersized lobsters, softshelled lobsters, and lobsters actually in breeding or pairing condition.
