DISCOLORED LOBSTERS.

It has been generally supposed by our fish packers that discoloration of canned lobsters is caused by a too free use of acid in sealing the cans.

The cause of the discoloration of canned lobsters is being enquired into in Canada as well as in the United States.

It is noted that the increase in discolored tins has come about since undersized lobster packing has been resorted to.

Dr. Wakeham's suggestion of possible causes of discoloration are referred to in the report.
