INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY. -The total revenue from the Intercolonial for the year ending 30th June, 1894, was \$2,987,-510, a decrease of \$77,988 which was about enally divided between passenger and freight traffic. The working expenses totalled \$2,981,671, a decrease of \$66,000, thus leaving a surplus of revenue over working expenses of \$5,838. The receipts from passenger traffic were for 1894, \$958,-915 and for 1893, \$1,002,912: and from freight traffic for 1894, \$1,834,126, compared with \$1,868,823 for 1893. The revenue from the Prince Edward Island Railway was \$159,994, a decrease of \$2,-696 below 1893; the expenses were \$226,-891, an increase of \$400,000, leaving a deficit of \$66,896, which was \$3,164 greater than in 1893.


