

LOCAL & GENERAL.

ORDINATIONS.—Two priests for the Diocese of St. John were recently ordained at Montreal—Rev. Father Gallagher, of Johnville, and Rev. Father Laplante. The former has been sent to Milltown as assistant to Rev. E. Doyle; Father Laplante has become assistant to Rev. J. F. X. Michaud, at Buctouche.

INTERCOLONIAL RAILWAY.—The total revenue from the Intercolonial for the year ending 30th June, 1894, was \$2,987,510, a decrease of \$77,988 which was about equally divided between passenger and freight traffic. The working expenses totalled \$2,981,671, a decrease of \$66,000, thus leaving a surplus of revenue over working expenses of \$5,838. The receipts from passenger traffic were for 1894, \$958,915 and for 1893, \$1,002,912; and from freight traffic for 1894, \$1,834,126, compared with \$1,868,833 for 1893. The revenue from the Prince Edward Island Railway was \$159,994, a decrease of \$2,696 below 1893; the expenses were \$226,891, an increase of \$400,000, leaving a deficit of \$66,896, which was \$3,164 greater than in 1893.

Kent County Council.

Warden Leslie J. Wathen called the council to order at 2 o'clock p. m., Tuesday, 8th inst. All the councillors except Bourgeois and Poirier, of Dundas, were present. Minutes of last meeting were read and approved.

Moved by Coun. Bernard that Thomas Frecker be appointed constable at \$1.00 per day to attend the meetings of council. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Johnson that constable procure stationery for the use of the council. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Bernard that standing committees be appointed.

Coun. Murphy moved that the finance committee consist of one councillor from each parish. The following councillors were named by the Warden:—

A petition was read from Basil S. Myres asking for a refund of taxes. Jude Finagan, one of the assessors in the parish of Richibucto was heard in the matter. No action was taken.

A petition was presented from Mr. Pineau, of Acaidville, in re election protest. Mr. Hutchinson, Clerk of the Peace, gave it as his opinion, that the council had no power to deal with this matter, and the matter was allowed to stand over.

In the matter of reducing the salaries of the county officials, Mr. Hutchinson said that if the council had any idea of the great amount of work that devolved upon the Clerk of the Peace, they would not consider his salary too high.

Moved by Coun. Murphy, seconded by Coun. F. M. Richard that the report of the inspector of licenses be received at 10 o'clock to-morrow, and those of the standing committees be received in the afternoon. Adjourned.

—The Chinese generals who lost Port Arthur are to be tried at Pekin and will likely lose their heads. "He that fights and runs away will live to fight another day" has no application in China. If the Chinaman stands to fight he is killed, and if he runs away he has his head cut off, and their cry for peace under the circumstances can be easily understood.

—Mr. Robt. Hutchinson, of Molus River, the well known fish dealer, says that the eel fishery this season is almost a total failure, owing to the prevailing low prices. Mr. Hutchinson handled some thirteen tons of frozen eels last season, but he has been unable to dispose of any this season at a remunerative figure. The fishermen are holding what they have on hand in hopes of a rise in the market.

—The two great republics of the world are found to resemble each other in one very peculiar feature. There is a decline of the birth rate both in the United States and France. The American and French families are steadily growing smaller. The subject is creating anxiety in France, but in the United States at the present time, where there is what is considered a surplus population, the phenomenon is regarded as rather a fortunate one.

—It was thought when Japan began war upon China that the latter had a full treasury and would not lack means to set up a stout defence. It has since become known that there was very little money available in China and now the Government is reported as in great straits for money. Several attempts to effect loans in Europe have fallen through, a sure sign of lack of confidence in the Chinese by the financial institutions of Europe. To raise funds the Chinese Government is now offering literary degrees for sale. About \$1,000 will purchase a B. A., \$2,000 an M. A., and for \$5,000 the distinction of prefect can be secured. The indications are that the present dynasty is doomed.

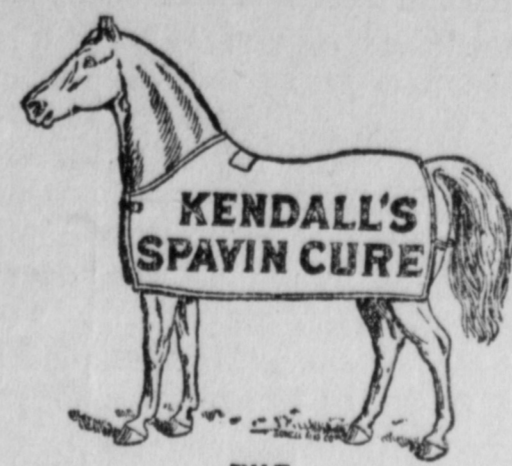
