THE NORMAL SCHOOL. - The results of the preliminary examinations for the Normal School, which were held in various parts of the province, have been announced. .The total number who entered into the examination was 528, and of those 323 passed for some class and 205 failed to get any class. There were 159 candidates for first class and of those 63 succeeded, 60 got second and 29 third, and 7 failed. 318 applied for second class 94 succeeded, 73 got third class, 151 failed, 51 applied for third class, 4 succeeded and 47 failed 63 passed successfully f r first class, 154 for second, and 106 for third.
