

### Ancient Glass Makers.

The glass blowers of ancient Thebes are known to have been as proficient in that particular art as the most scientific craftsmen of the same trade of the present day, after a lapse of forty centuries of so called "progress." They were well acquainted with the art of staining glass, and are known to have produced that commodity in great profusion and perfection. Rossellini gives an illustration of a piece of stained glass known to be 4,000 years old, which displayed artistic design of high order, both in tint and design. In this case the color is struck through the vitrified structure, and he mentions designs struck entirely in pieces from one-half inch to three-quarter inch thick, the colour being entirely incorporated with the structure of the piece, and exactly the same on both the obverse and reverse sides. The priests of Ptah at Memphis were adepts in the glassmaker's art, and not only did they have factories for manufacturing the common crystal variety, but they had learned the vitrifying the different colours and the imitating of precious stones to perfection. Their imitation of the amethyst and of the various other coloured gems were so true to nature that even now, after they have lain in the desert sands from 2,000 to 4,000 years, it takes an expert to distinguish the genuine articles from the spurious. It has been shown that, besides being experts in glassmaking and glass colouring, they used the diamond in cutting and engraving glass, with an engraved emblement of the monarch Thothmes III., who lived 3,400 years ago.—Scientific American.

It was generally believed that Pate had no motive for striking the Queen, and that he was the victim of a momentary attack of insanity but the good conduct of a lifetime could not gain for him permission to visit his native land.

"But I never see a fly in your house," said her friend. "How do you manage it? For my part I must confess that screens or no screens, my summer means to me one long battle with the little pests."  
"My remedy is quite a simple one," said the good housekeeper. "and I learned it years ago from my grandmother, when I used to watch her putting bunches of lavender flowers around to keep the flies away. My method is simpler. I buy five cents worth of oil of lavender at the drug store and mix it with the same quantity of water. The odor is especially agreeable to flies and they will never venture in its neighborhood, though to most people it has a peculiarly fresh and grateful smell."
