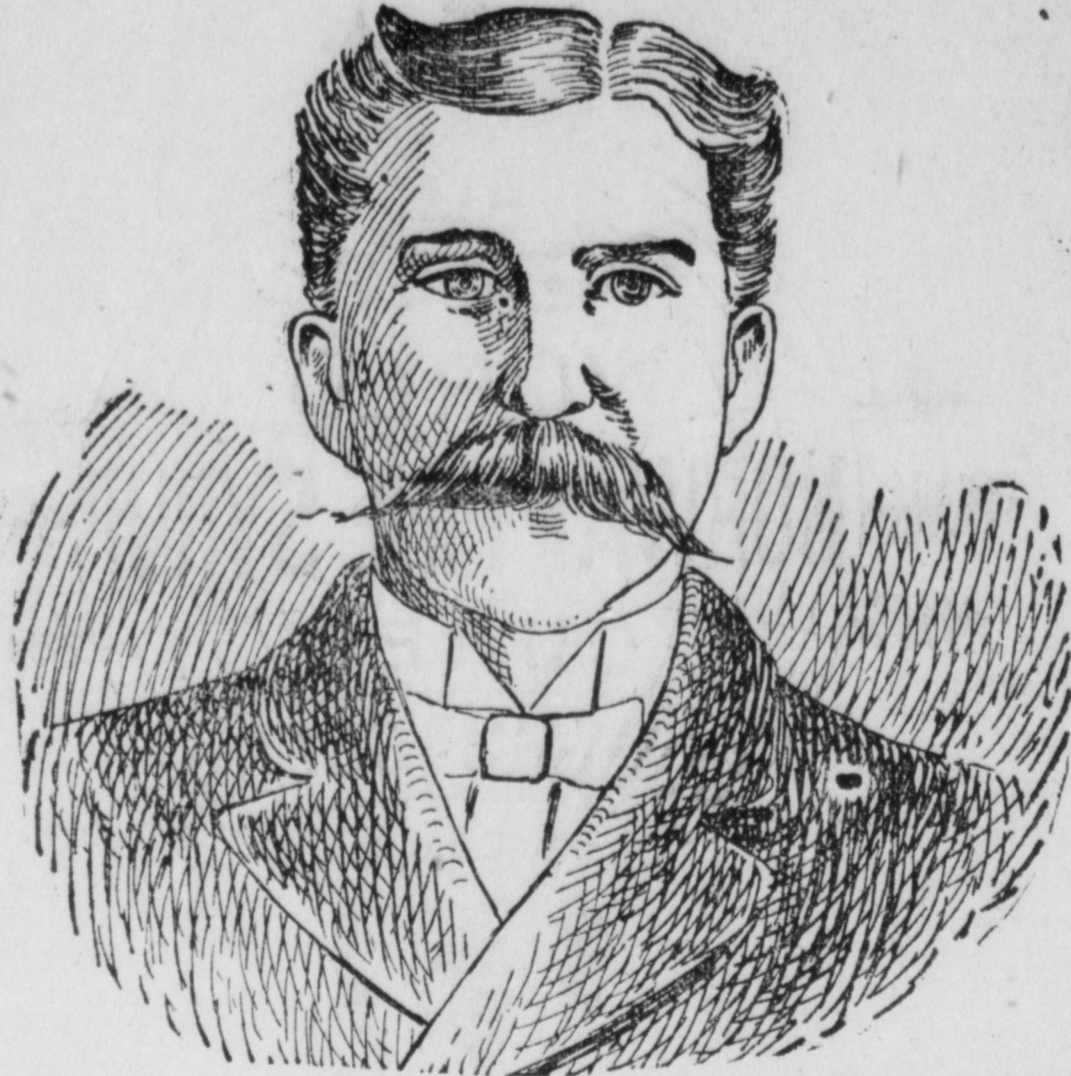


AN EMINENT MINISTER
