



CABINET PUDDING.—Butter a melon mould, and decorate it with candied fruit, or with raisins boiled till soft and seeded; then put in a layer of lady fingers, or stale sponge cake, then a few pieces of fruit, and repeat till the mould is nearly full. Pour one pint of boiling milk into the volks of three eggs, beaten with three table spoonfuls of sugar and half a saltspoonful of salt. Pour over the cake in the mould. Set the mould in a pan of warm water on the back of the stove half an hour, then bake one hour, keeping it in the pan of hot water. Serve hot with a rich sauce.

APRICOTS A LA NEIGE. - Boil one cupful of rice fifteen minutes. Wring small pudding-cloths, one-third of a yard square out of hot water, and lay them over a small half-pint bowl. Spread the rice onethird of an inch thick over the cloth. Put an apricot in the centre, filling the cavity in each half spricot with rice. Draw the cloth around till the apricot is covered smoothly with the rice. Tie tightly, and steam ten minutes. Remove the cloth carefully, turn the balls out on a platter, and serve with liquid sauce.

FARINA PUDDING .- For this pudding there are needed: One quart milk, four heaping tablespoonfuls of farina previously soaked in a little cold water for one hour, one tablespoonful of butter, one teaspoonful of salt, two eggs. Scald the milk in the double boiler; stir in the salt, then the soaked farina, and cook steadily threequarters of an hour. Add the butter; take a cupful of the boiling mixture, and beat into the whipped eggs. Put back into the saucepan, stir for two minutes and pour into a deep open dish. Serve with cream and sugar.
