OBITUARY .- Mr. Wm. Morton, one of the oldest and most respected farmers of West Branch, died at his home on Friday st, at the advanced age of 74 years. Mr. Morton who had been in poor health for some time, attended the funeral of his brother John, who died only a short time ago, and there contracted a severe cold which resulted in his death.

Mr. Thomas Dixon, one of Kent's most respectable and successful farmers, died at his residence at Mill Creek, on Thursday evening last, aged 61 years. Mr. Dixon ad been afflicted with rheumatism for the ht years past, the greater part of which time he was confined to his bed. Sometimes, however, he was well enough to go about a little, but not able to do any work. He bore his great affliction cheerfully. The last six months of his life was spent almost wholly in bed, and an attack of pneumonia which lasted only a few days ended his life. He leaves a widow and eight children, five sons and three daughters. Deceased was one of these men for whom everybody had a good word. The funeral which took place on Sunday, was very largely attended. Rev. Wm. Hamilton officiated.

WONDERFUL PHENOMENON.-A brilliant meteor was seen in Louison Brook, Restigouche, one evening recently, writes a correspondent, which illuminated the whole heavens. 




