He landed in the town of Morden with a few, a very few dollars in his pocket. He was full of courage and energy that did not easily tire, and went to work with true Canadian pluck. He is now the possessor of some 480 acres of land worth fifteen dollars per acre. He has sown and cultivated nearly three hundred acres of wheat and other grains. He sold this year some 4800 bushels of wheat and fifteen fat steers, and other products aggregating in value nearly three thousand dollars. He has five spans of fine Clydesdales for work, and a span of handsome carriage horses, besides two binders and farm machinery in proportion. His house is a handsome structure worth some two thousand dollars. His barns are well finished buildings and his outfit (as it is called here) is of the best. His total property, is, I am assured by the banker at Morden worth to-day in these dull times ten thousand dollars at the hammer, with no encumbrance. Mr. Lawson did not make the mistake so common here of attempting to grasp too much land. He cultivates his land with an eye to the future, which I am sorry to say is not so common here as it should be. He is an enthusiastic believer in Manitoba, and while not wishing to influence anyone in the choice of a home, he thinks that if there is one spot on earth more blessed than another it is Southern Manitoba. If Mr. Lawson had accomplished this success in the States we should have had his success used to allure young men away from their own country, but because it was achieved in Canada, and by farming alone, we hear not a word of this. Manitoba is full of such instances, yet but little is said of these, while we hear some worthless creature shouting that he did not succeed while the only bar to his success was the bar of some hotel. 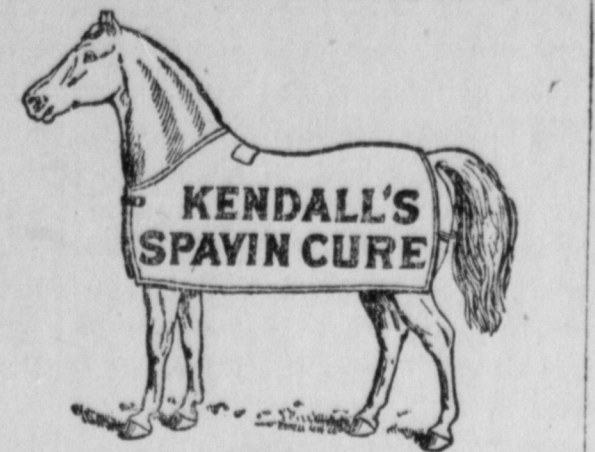

NUGGETS.

—Auction sale at Smith's auction room Saturday night. —A quantity of correspondence, etc., crowded out of this issue. —Shingles and pulp wood have been placed on the free list under the tariff act of last session. —The taxes in Richibucto parish were so well paid last year that the delinquency amounted to only three per cent. —More than four hundred employees of the Canadian Pacific railway are out of work in Montreal, owing to hard times. —Nearly half the members of the Kent Municipal Council are six feet and over in height, Councillor McMaster leading the van, with six feet four inches. —A German statistician has computed that Greece stands in the first rank, among European countries in the number of centenarians. He attributes this to its climate. —The post of English poet laureate, rendered vacant by the death of Lord Tennyson, still remains vacant. Lord Rosebery is to be asked to make an early appointment. —Don't fail to attend the dramatic performance at Bass River, on Saturday evening next. "Ten Nights in a Bar Room," will be put on by the Harcourt Amateur Dramatic Club. —The soft weather during the last few days has stagnated the smelt business. Small catches are made and it is feared that if the present mild weather continues all the nets will have to be taken off the ice. —How about your linen closets? See what Daniel & Robertson have to say on the subject. —The United States Treasury Department has awarded a contract for the raising of the British frigate Hussar, which foundered off Fort Morris, East River, N. Y., during the revolutionary war, and is supposed to have on board nearly five million dollars in British gold. —A young man named Myers, son of Mr. Dominic Myers, of the Dollard Settlement, St. Mary's, had his feet frozen a few days ago, and it was found necessary to have one of them amputated. The young man is doing as well as can be expected under the circumstances. —On Friday last, at the Village, Mrs. John Frank Richard, who resides with Joseph Frank Richard, fell and broke one of her legs near the hip. Dr. Ferguson rendered the necessary surgical aid and the patient is doing as well as could be expected under the circumstances. —Arthur Campbell, son of John Campbell, of the I. C. R. car mileage office, committed suicide in Moncton on Monday morning, by shooting himself in the heart. Deceased who was 24 years of age, is supposed to have committed the rash act while laboring under a fit of temporary insanity. —The ice opposite town and all the way down the river is unsafe for crossing. No horse has crossed since Saturday. Many of the fishermen had to remove their nets near the beaches and the harbor is open as far up as the inside point of the south beach. On the 15th Jan., 1892, the harbor was open and some boats sailed up from Indian Island. —According to the Timber, a London publication, the liabilities of James Smith & Co., timber brokers, Liverpool, are over £63,000. Nathaniel McNair, of River Louison, Restigouche, is given as a creditor for £2,265 and George Dutch, of New Mills, Restigouche, as a creditor for £1,000. R. H. Montgomery, of New Richmond, Que., is a creditor for £1,920. —A. G. Wallace, of Dalhousie, has two shingle mills on the Eel river running day and night; Wm. P. Gray one on Dundee and W. H. Miller one on Christopher brook; J. P. Mowat one at Flat Lands and one at Metapedia and F. Standcliff one of three machines at Flat Lands and they all find a ready sale for the shingles in the Boston market. A. E. OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—The revenue for December shows an increase of \$8,000 over the corresponding period of 1893. For the six months, however, there is a falling off of two millions, the total revenue for the first half of this year being \$16,399,486. The expenditure for the same period amounts to \$14,120,418. A proclamation will appear in the Canada Gazette to-morrow placing shingles and pulp wood on the free list under the tariff act of last session, the United States having reciprocated in this respect. Another proclamation puts in force from the first inst., the amendment to the criminal code of last session enacting that seven jurors instead of twelve may find a true bill in any province where the panel of grand jurors does not exceed thirteen.
