Upon resuming the chair, Warden Wathen thanked the council for the faithful manner they had performed their duties and the great forbearance they had shown towards him. He hoped to see every man but himself elected next year. Adjourned sine die.



The Secret of Warm Feet.

The first and most important rule is never to be tightly shod. Boots or shoes that fit closely prevent the free circulation of the blood by pressure; but when, on the contrary, they do not embrace the feet too firmly, the space left between the shoe and the stocking has a good supply of warm air. The second rule is never to sit in damp shoes. It is often supposed that unless shoes are positively wet it is unnecessary to change them while the feet are at rest. This is a great fallacy, for when the least dampness is absorbed into the sole in its evaporation, it absorbs the heat from the foot, and thus perspiration is dangerously checked. This can easily be proved by trying the experiment of neglecting the rule. The feet will be found cold and damp after a few minutes, although on taking off the shoe and examining it it will appear to be quite dry.






