Return of overseers of the poor, West Welford, passed.

Collectors' returns for Welford, passed. Collectors' returns for St. Paul, passed. Dr. Bourque explained his visit to Co-cagne as chairman of board of health and for which he had put in a bill of \$18.00. \$12.00 was ordered to be paid.

Dr. Bourque's bill for \$26.75 for holding inquest on the body of Herbert Stewart was reduced by the auditor to \$21.75 which was ordered to be paid.

Dr. C. O. LeBlanc's bill for holding inquest on the body of Alexis Caissie, Co-cagne, \$16.00 was ordered to be paid.

Dr. Bourque's bill for visiting Alex. Robertson's place in connection with board of health, \$5.00. Ordered to be paid.

Mrs. Powell's bill for keeping Power, a deaf mute, was referred to full board.

Dr. Olloqui's bill for holding inquest on the body of Sally Francis, \$14.00, was ordered to be paid. Adjourned.

FRIDAY, Jan. 11th, 1895.

Council called to order at 10 o'clock a. m.

Full board present.

Minutes of last meeting read and approved.

A petition from G. W. Robertson for a refund of taxes \$5.20 paid to the collector in St. Louis parish. Mr. Robertson claimed that he had been taxed on property he did not own. A committee consisting of Coun. F. M. Richard, Bernard and McAlmon were appointed to examine the records with regard to this matter and report in the afternoon.

A petition signed by 55 of the ratepayers of the town of Richibucto against lighting the streets of the town was read. Sheriff Leger who had acted as chairman of the meeting held Dec. 22nd to consider the matter of lighting the streets, was heard.

It was resolved to hold a special session at 7 o'clock p. m., to consider this matter.

List of parish officers for Welford read and approved.

Special Session.

FRIDAY, 7 o'clock p. m.

Full board present, and a large number of citizens.

Warden explained the object of the session, reading the resolution passed at meeting held in the court house, 22nd Dec., 1894, in re lighting the streets of Richibucto; also a petition signed by 55 ratepayers of the town against lighting streets.

Coun. McAlmon moved, seconded by Coun. Bernard that the citizens be heard. Messrs. H. O'Leary, J. F. Black, R. Phinney, F. S. Sayre, Ephraim Pine, Wm. Barnett, Allan Hains, Wm. Long, S. C. Weeks, Peter Barnett, Robert Cochrane, Robt. McKinnon, Hiram Thompson, John T. Caie gave their views on the subject.

Coun. Johnson moved that petition be laid on the table till 10 o'clock to-morrow. Carried.

Adjourned.

A bill from James Thurrott for \$14.20 constable fees for arresting Cyril Renaud, charged with larceny last year was referred to finance committee.

List of parish officers for Acadieville, read and approved.

List of parish officers for Carleton, read and approved.

Coun. Girouard moved the following resolution seconded by Coun. Coates:

I move that a side boom be made at Big River lumber boom near Philippe Girouard's, Parish of St. Mary, by the owner or owners of said Big River lumber boom, and said boom shall be on south side the river, to make a passage for boats, scows, rafts of lumber, etc., for the benefit of the public, that boom shall be made with blocks and piling loaded with stone and the passage shall be made to the satisfaction of the boom master, for the Parish of St. Mary, County of Kent, N. B., and shall be done on or before the first day of April, 1895, also the expenses for the same shall be paid by the owner or owners of the lumber of said boom, and this boom shall be made double and single and be fast with iron bolts or keys.

Mrs. Elizabeth Powell's bill for keeping Power, a deaf mute, was laid before the full board. After some discussion which was participated in by the Warden, Coun. Johnson, Mr. Richardson, and the Clerk of the Peace, who explained the law on the subject, it was ordered that \$15.00 be paid Mrs. Powell.

Coun. Atkinson moved that the following bye-law be adopted:

Be it ordained by the municipality of Kent—that a penalty not exceeding eight dollars be imposed upon any person or persons who shall by insulting or abusive language or behavior, taunting epithets or threatening gestures attempt to provoke another person to commit a breach of the peace in any public street, thoroughfare, alley-road or bye-road or in any building or whereby a breach of the peace may be occasioned, and any Justice or Justices of the Peace having jurisdiction shall have the power of fining with costs to the extent so imposed or less according to his or their discretion, or may imprison the offender or offenders in the common jail for a term not exceeding twenty days, the fines so imposed when collected to be paid to the treasurer of the municipality of the County of Kent for the use of the County.

The following bye-laws were read and adopted:

To the Municipal Council:

Your committee appointed to draw up by-laws for the regulation of the committee meeting in July in lieu of the 2nd semi-annual session in each year, respectfully submit the following:—

By-Law.

1. A committee of three Councillors, chosen at the first semi-annual meeting of the Council, in each year, shall meet at the court house, in Richibucto, on the 3rd Tuesday in July, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, and shall consider and determine all such bills and claims against the said municipality as shall arise, and be fairly payable on or before the 1st day of July in each year.

2. All bills and claims to be considered by such committee shall be filed with the county secretary on or before the 2nd Tuesday in July, and be audited by the county auditor.

3. The committee shall choose a chairman and the county secretary shall be secretary of the committee.

4. The committee may refer any bill or claim to the next first semi-annual meeting of the council.

5. In the unavoidable absence of any member of the committee from the meeting in July, the remaining committee men shall select another councillor to take his place, which councillor shall have all the power vested in the councillor whose place he is selected to fill.

The bill of the valuator was presented and Coun. Murphy moved that Messrs. Leger and Flanagan be paid \$10.00 each and Mr. Curran be paid \$12.00 for their services in the Peters enquiry.

List of lumber surveyors for all the parishes of the county read and approved. Adjourned.

AFTERNOON SESSION, Jan. 11, 1895.

Council called to order at 2 p. m.

Full board present.

Report of Henry O'Leary, secretary of firewards for Richibucto, read and accepted.

Report of committee appointed to examine the records in regard to G. W. Robertson's assessment was read by Coun. Bernard and accepted.

Moved by Coun. Johnson, seconded by Coun. Bernard that G. W. Robertson's petition be referred to finance committee. Carried.

Coun. Murphy read report of committee appointed to visit and investigate the condition of the registry office. Report accepted.

Coun. G. S. Richard moved that tavern license be \$40.00.

Poor Grants for 1895 were voted as follows:

Coun. McMaster stated with pardonable pride that his parish didn't need anything for this purpose.

Coun. Bernard gave notice that he would to-morrow at 10 o'clock move that no horses or sheep be allowed to run in the parish of St. Paul between the 1st of May and 31st December.

\$25.00 were voted for fire purposes in Richibucto for 1895.

Parish officers, Harcourt, read and approved.

A bill from James Thurrott for \$14.25 constable fees in the case of Cyril Renaud was presented. \$12.00 was ordered to be paid.

A bill from C. D. Cormier, St. Paul, for \$20.00 for taking patient to Provincial Lunatic Asylum, ordered to be paid.

Returns of commissioners and surveyors of roads, St. Paul, passed.

Returns of commissioners and surveyors Nos. 1 and 3 Wellington, passed.

Return of overseers of the poor, South Welford passed.

Coun. McAlmon's bill for attending on jail committee ordered to be paid.

Coun. Leger and Warden Wathen's bill of \$10.00 for revising assessment books ordered to be paid.

Collectors' returns, Harcourt, passed.

Collectors' books No. 1 and 3 Carleton, passed.

Books of collector No. 2 Carleton, sent back for correction.

John B. Johnson's bill of \$15.50 for constable fees thrown out.

Bill of James Fraser and Wm. J. Fraser for \$20.00 witness fees in the case of Queen vs. Frank Curwin charged with stealing net from Angus Durant, ordered to be paid.

A bill of Philip Woods for \$21.75 constable fees arresting Jephtha and Neil Sherwood in St. Mary's parish, ordered to be paid.

A petition of Dr. Olloqui for a balance of \$11.75 claimed to be due him, rejected.

J. D. Phinney's bill \$15.00 for professional services in the prosecution of John Fraser, Harcourt, for resisting constable referred to next session.

Dr. C. O. LeBlanc's bill of \$4.00 for services rendered board of health at St. Anne, rejected.

Collectors' returns No. 1 Welford, passed.

Moved by Coun. McAlmon, seconded by Coun. Murray that G. W. Robertson's taxes \$5.20 be refunded and added to St. Louis warrant. Carried.

Finance committee adjourned sine die.

SATURDAY, Jan. 12th, 1895.

Council called to order at 10 a. m.

Full board present.

Minutes of preceeding session read and approved.

The Warden named the following councillors Public Wharf Committee: Basil Johnson, Alex. Murray and F. M. Richard; Jail Committee: Councillors David McAlmon, Reuben S. Richard and F. M. Richard.

Considerable discussion here took place with regard to repairs needed on the public wharf.

Coun. Atkinson moved, seconded by Coun. Murphy that the wharf committee be authorized to ask for tenders for the repairing of wharf, the amount to be expended for this purpose not to exceed \$150.00. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the committee appointed to meet in July consist of Couns. Johnson, Murphy and Warden Wathen. Carried.

As per motion given yesterday, Coun. Bernard moved that the following bye-law be adopted:

Resolved: that no sheep or horse be allowed to run at large in the Parish of St. Paul's after the first day of May until the first day of December in each year.

2nd. Any sheep or horse that will be found running at large, contrary to this regulation, a fine of one dollar be imposed on the owner of such sheep or horse, for each and every infraction of this regulation together with costs.

3rd. Fines when collected to be paid into the Overseers of the Poor of said Parish of St. Paul.

4th. Such fines to be collected by any Justice of the Peace for the Parish of St. Pauls on application of any ratepayer of said Parish, and on non-payment of any fine so imposed the offending sheep or horse may be sold by Public Auction as under ordinary execution.

Moved by Coun. Coates, seconded by Coun. Girouard that John McNairn and Anthony Johnson be added to the list of lumber surveyors for the County of Kent. Carried.

Coun. Johnson seconded by Coun. F. M. Richard moved the following resolution which was adopted:

Whereas Sylvain Goguen, of the Parish of Dundas, in the County of Kent, was at the January Term 1894 of the County Court of Kent in the Province of New Brunswick, indicted by the Grand Jury of said County on six different Counts of shooting with intent to kill, with intent to maim and disable, with intent to do grievous bodily harm, with intent to wound, and also with unlawfully shooting; and whereas the Petit Jury, under the charge of His Honor Judge Wells, that they might find the prisoner guilty of unlawfully shooting without finding that he did so with malice; and whereas the Petit Jury according to said instructions did find him guilty of the least serious of all the charges against him—unlawfully shooting;—and whereas the Judge, after said verdict sentenced him to the most severe penalty allotted to the offence—two years in the Dorchester Penitentiary,—and whereas said Sylvain Goguen has now suffered imprisonment in said Penitentiary for one year in punishment of his offence; and whereas his conduct there has been uniformly commendable.

Therefore resolved that this Council memorialize the Governor General in Council to liberate the said Sylvain Goguen, believing as we firmly do that his offence was purely accidental, unintentional and without malice, his character otherwise perfectly irreproachable, and that he has already suffered more than ample punishment for the offence of which he was convicted.

The council requested that Mr. Caie, inspector of liquor licenses, be sent for and

Coun. Atkinson moved the adoption of a by-law, but was ruled out of order by the Warden, the customary twenty-four hours notice not having been given.

Coun. Atkinson asked that council's opinion be expressed as to the Warden's decision. The decision of the Warden was sustained by a vote of 12 to 4.

Coun. Atkinson moved that the requiring of twenty-four hours notice of any by-law become law. Carried.

Coun. Atkinson moved that the Secretary notify the collectors of rates in districts Nos. 1 and 3 Harcourt, to proceed at once to collect the delinquent taxes in their districts according to law. Carried.

Resolved that auditor's report be read. Mr. Richardson said that the finance committee's report should stand for his, and handed in the following figures:

Moved by Coun. F. M. Richard that 300 copies of THE REVIEW be printed and given to the Secretary for distribution amongst the French speaking people of the county.

Moved as an amendment by Coun. Poirier and seconded by Coun. Johnson that 200 copies of the minutes and accounts be published in pamphlet form for distribution in the French districts. Amendment carried.

Moved by Coun. Leger and seconded by Coun. G. S. Richard that \$60.00 be assessed on the county and \$55.00 on the parish of Wellington for lock-up. Motion lost.

Collectors' returns for district No. 1, Harcourt, passed.

Moved that Councillors Johnson and Murphy be paid \$3.50 each for services on public wharf committee. Carried.

Moved by Coun. Leger, seconded by Coun. G. S. Richard that \$115.00 be assessed on Wellington for lock-up. Carried.

Coun. Bernard read report of finance committee showing a balance of \$380.24 to the credit of the county.

Moved by Coun. Leger that the sum of \$110.00 collected in Wellington last year, be paid to lock-up committee. Carried.

Moved that Couns. McAlmon and Murray be paid \$3.50 for services on jail committee. Carried. Coun. F. M. Richard refused to accept any pay for his services on said committee.

Moved by Coun. Atkinson that Mr. Forbes keep the amount of his loan, \$760.00 out of the funds now in his hands. Carried.


Moved by Coun. Bernard that \$300.00 be assessed on the county for contingencies and \$1200.00 for debentures. Carried.

Moved by Coun. McAlmon, seconded by Coun. McMaster that Caleb Richardson be appointed auditor for the ensuing year. Moved as an amendment that David Grierson be appointed auditor for the ensuing year with a salary of \$30.00. Amendment carried.

Moved by Coun. Murphy and seconded by Bernard that Inspector Caie's salary be the same as last year. Carried.

Mr. Richardson requested that a standing vote be taken on the amendment that made Mr. Grierson auditor.


