—The prizes offered by the International Exhibition, St. John, N. B., are on the Live Stock and Agricultural departments. They aggregate about \$12,000. They are offered for competition to all exhibitors, without reference to the place of residence.

—The picnic and excursion, on Thursday last, under the auspices of Richibucto Division, S. of T., was an enjoyable affair. Over two hundred persons took advantage of the opportunity offered for a delightful sail on the river, the steamer going as far as Pass River point.

—The Rev. Walter Raven of Biddenden, Kent, England, was duly elected rector of St. Marys Episcopal church, parish of Richibucto on Saturday last, at a public meeting of the parishioners held for the purpose of electing a rector for said parish. Mr. Raven is an unmarried man. He was for some time stationed at New Glasgow, N. S., and comes highly recommended. It is expected he will be inducted about the first of November. In the meantime the church will be re-seated and otherwise repaired and fitted up.

—A fair sized crowd assembled at the driving park on Wednesday to witness the match race, for a purse of \$75.00, between Lucy H., owned by A. C. —A severe hailstorm visited the parish of St. Louis on Wednesday last and did considerable damage to grain and other crops. The hailstones were nearly as large as hens eggs and in some places by actual measurement covered the ground to a depth of twelve inches. Scarcely a whole pane of glass was left in the windows of houses exposed to the storm. Mr. Michael Vautour whose farm is on the north bank of the Kouchibouguac river, near the village of St. Louis, suffered severe loss as nearly his entire crop was destroyed and 40 panes of glass broken in his house. The path of the storm was about one quarter of a mile wide. Messrs. Sylvester Maillet and Simon Vautour had their crops badly damaged.

—A correspondent at Yarmouthville, Me., sends the following account of the drowning of James Sutherland, noticed in our last issue: James Sutherland the youngest son of James Sutherland formerly of Main River was accidentally drowned on the 6th inst in the Merriack River, while engaged in running a raft of logs with three other men for the firm of Henry & Sons of Lincoln, N. H. Shortly after dinner he and a comrade noticed a well on the shore and both being good swimmers they decided to swim ashore and get a drink of fresh water, the distance not being over two hundred and fifty feet. They slipped off their clothing and started, when within twenty feet of the shore he was seized with cramps threw up his hands, and exclaimed "Boys I cannot make it," and sank instantly, never coming to the surface again. His friend dived after him but the muddy water prevented his being found. His body was discovered about eight hours afterwards and taken to Lowell, where his brothers were notified. On their arrival they found the body in such a condition it was impossible to have it removed to the burial ground in Kingston so it was taken to Yarmouthville, Me. and buried there. The Rev. A. C. Stockpole held funeral services at the grave. The deceased was twenty-seven years old and unmarried. He leaves three brothers and three sisters to mourn the loss of a loving and affectionate brother. His genial disposition endeared him to all with whom he associated and the floral offerings sent by his friends attested the esteem in which he was held by his associates.
