Mrs. Rolling has been arrested at St Thomas, Ont., charged with attempting to kill her child, by shooting it with a revolver. The attempt was not a success fortunately.

The emperor of Japan has declared an unconditional armistice, which was greatly due to the extreme indignation aroused by the attempt on Viceroy Li Hung Chang's life.

A snow storm which set in Thursday night east of Amherst caused considerable trouble to the I. C. R. and branch lines. From 8 to 15 inches of snow fell at different points.

James Keelin, one of the most famous spies of the Confederate Army, the only one whom Davis and his Cabinet trusted with important secrets, died at the Civic Hospital, Kansas City, Friday night. Of late years Keelin lived by his wits, and was recognized as a broken down gambler.

A deputation representing the Montreal International Exhibition Association saw Premier Bowell on Saturday and asked for a Dominion grant of \$250,000 in aid of the proposed world's fair at Montreal next year. The Premier was non-committal in his reply, and told them to put their request in writing.

Dr. Hotchkiss possessed many striking peculiarities, among them being a natural aversion to water. He is said by those nearest to him to have not taken a bath for over twenty-five years, but scoured himself with dry sand.
