

GENERAL NEWS.

There are now in circulation Dominion one and two-dollar notes to the amount of \$6,486,330.

Robert Newbury, who committed suicide after killing his wife and niece in the province of Ontario last week, leaves a sister in Fall River, Mass. She proposes to put in a claim for a portion of his estate, although she has not heard from him for twenty-five years.

In the German Reichstag the resolution to repeal the laws banishing Jesuits passed its third reading without debate. The Conservatives, Imperialists and National-Liberals opposed the resolution. The Centre (Clericals) loudly cheered its adoption.

A despatch from Odessa to the London Standard says the town of Koutchat, near Astrabad, Persia, has been swallowed by earthquake and several thousand persons have perished. This seems to be another version of the report conveyed in a Teheran despatch to the Times on Jan. 26th of the destruction of the town of Kuchan, whereby about two thousand persons were killed.

A special from Hot Springs, Ark., Friday, says an uncontrollable fire has been raging there since four o'clock in the morning. Among the buildings burned are a number of boarding houses, and at nine o'clock it was known at least eight persons had lost their lives.

Thursday evening, at Omaha, Neb. John Matthews shot his wife Anna and afterwards himself. He died in forty-five minutes, but his wife will live.

Banking returns from all the Australian colonies for the last quarter show the holdings of bullion to be £25,000,000, the largest on record.

During the recent snow storm in Louisiana four hunters were frozen to death in the woods 19 miles from New Orleans.

"The Princess Paulina," now in New York, is probably the smallest dwarf living. She is 10 inches tall and weighs only nine pounds. She was born in Holland, is 19 years old and speaks four languages fluently.

A stranger who was shown round Peterborough cathedral, England, the other day gave the dean a cheque for twenty thousand dollars toward the fund for a new organ.

Fifty new looms, for high grade work are being put in the St. Croix cotton mill.

After four days debate the American House has voted that the navy be further increased by the construction of three battleships and nine torpedo boats.

The California Assembly has passed a bill prohibiting the wearing of high hats at places of amusement.

A man name Flaherty attempted suicide at Halifax yesterday by cutting his throat with a carving knife. It is expected that he will recover.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 22.—The commissioner in his report for 1894 says: "As to foreign countries more patents were granted to subjects of Great Britain than any other country. Next in order comes Germany and the Dominion of Canada."

Premier Davie, of British Columbia, has been appointed chief justice of the province in succession to Hon. Mr. Begbie, deceased.

The resolution offered in the Manitoba Legislature by James Fisher, affirming that the Legislature is ready to consider the grievances of the Roman Catholic minority on the school question, was opposed by the government and defeated.

Justice Crease sentenced John Simpson and Peter Nelson to five years imprisonment at Victoria, B. C., for the robbery of bonded warehouses at the outer wharf. As they were leaving the dock Simpson observed, "Thank you, sir," for which he was brought back and given three years additional, a year for each word.

Referring to the Egyptian situation the Journal des Debats, Paris, insists that it is the task of France to rouse Continental Europe so that its sympathy is with Egypt as against Great Britain.

How seriously a little scare affects business is illustrated by the fact that since the death of a Wesleyan College student from typhoid fever, caused by eating oysters dug from a de-filed oyster bed, the export trade in these bivalves has fallen off so heavily that the Englishmen have sent an agent over here to see what's the trouble. He will find that a good deal of unnecessary alarm has been occasioned by the carelessness of a single Connecticut oysterman who didn't know his business.

Frederick Douglas, the noted freedman orator, died on Wednesday night in Anacostia, a suburb of Washington.

A young farmer of Harrison, Ont., named Wm. J. Shannon, while engaged in oiling some part of the machinery of his windmill, fell, and was drawn into the shaft, being killed almost instantly.

Steps are being taken to erect a monument to the memory of D'Arcy McGee in Toronto. They are well received and it is likely a handsome bronze statue and a monument will be placed in Queen's park near that of the late Sir John Macdonald.

Nineteen bishops and two and a half priests have signified their intention of being present at the consecration of Archbishop Langerin at Winnipeg next month.

New York city continues to be the Mecca of the millionaires. Three residents of the West whose combined fortunes are set at \$100,000,000 have lately moved their household gods to New York, and are building palaces in Fifth avenue. The income tax collector ought to find some very rich pickings in New York.

The French mail steamship has arrived at Marseilles from Tonquin (China), bringing advices that a French convoy composed of twenty-two men was attacked in December, by a party of Tonquinese pirates. Thirteen French soldiers were killed and eight wounded.

The Canadian Pacific Railway on Friday declared a dividend of half of one per cent. for the past half year.

Two men named Dana and Spurr were killed in a railway accident on the C. P. R. at L'Acadie, Que., on Friday.

Joseph Gabriel, the Oldtown, Me. Indian indicted for the murder of a Spaniard and Frenchman in a camp in Maine, on Friday pleaded guilty of manslaughter and will get the maximum penalty, ten years.

Right Rev. Michael Rowley was on Friday installed Roman Catholic Bishop of St. John's, being the first Newfoundland-er to attain that dignity in this diocese. The event was jubilantly celebrated, as the new bishop is highly esteemed.

Eight dogs were poisoned with strychnine in the dog show at New York on Friday. There has been more or less jealousy among exhibitors of pet or toy dogs since the show began and the awarding of prizes did not diminish the ill-feeling. The managers of the show have offered a reward for the poisoner.

Preparations for sending out the fleet which will engage in the seal fishery are now in active progress in Newfoundland. About twenty steamers are going this year. The sealing prospects are good. There was a sharp advance in the price of seal oil a few days ago. Good results from the fishery will help much to relieve the distress prevailing in the colony. The number of destitute is increasing daily. About seven thousand are now receiving relief in St. John's.

Sir Henry James's motion censuring the Rosebery government in connection with Indian cotton duties, was defeated in the English commons Thursday night—304 to 109—nearly 200 majority.

PARIS, Feb. 23.—The Marquis of Dufferin, British ambassador to France, made the principal speech at the annual banquet of the British Chamber of Commerce last evening. He said that despite certain current criticisms from which it might be inferred that France and England were taking antagonistic courses in politics, there had never been a time since his arrival in Paris when the relations of the two countries were more friendly and more obviously conciliatory on both sides. He cited as an illustration the recent convention as to Sierra Leone, which, he remarked, showed clearly the reciprocal desire to discuss international questions in a just and generous spirit. The convention should be regarded, he thought, as a most favorable omen of the settlement of other stubborn questions which were awaiting international treatment in Africa.

The suicide of young Willie Godrey at Carp Ont., is being investigated, and the coroner's jury has adjourned to ascertain what kind of novels the lad was in the habit of reading, it having been suggested that this led to his death.

When Noel Carignan and his wife, of Stanfold, P. Q., returned home from church on Sunday morning last, they found the body of their daughter, aged eighteen, hanging from a beam in the barn. A coroner's jury has rendered a verdict of insanity, committed while temporarily insane.

Peter Fitzpatrick fell into a vat of boiling water at Dyers tannery, Newark, N. J. He splashed about wildly in his awful bath, and when fellow workmen came to his aid he was still conscious and screaming in his agony. His body literally boiled. His flesh dropped off in large fragments. Death resulted.

A despatch from Tangier says rebel tribesmen entered and looted the city of Morocco. British man-of-war has arrived at Tangier from Gibraltar. The rebels and inhabitants of Morocco had bloody fights in the city streets. Many were killed and hundreds injured. The Jewish quarter of the city is said to have been spared.

The police of St. Louis, Mo., have arrested three Italians for circulating counterfeit coins. The "queer" captured is almost perfect. The police say the men are agents of the Adams gang of New York, which is reported to have coined from pure silver at least \$1,000,000 and smaller denominations and circulated the counterfeits in the United States, Canada and Europe, making a profit of \$500,000.

Nash's Creek. The night freight going east on the 21st inst., ran over Jeremiah Murphy, and mangled him very badly, a few yards beyond Nash's Creek Station. The officials would not have known what had occurred if it had not been for the heavy moaning of the unfortunate man. It is evident that he was lying on the track at the time the accident occurred. He was taken to Campbellton by the express at midnight, and placed in the hospital for medical attendance. He died a few hours afterwards. When he was found on the track he had three bottles of liquor on his person.

Scarlet fever is prevalent here. During the last few days two children of Mr. Henry died of the disease, and also Miss Edward, a young woman of Escuminac, P. Q., who was assisting the family at the time. In the fatal cases of the fever putrid sore throat was developed.

Mr. P. Stewart, after a lingering illness, died on the 20th inst., aged 87. The funeral was largely attended on the 22nd inst. Services were conducted by the Rev. T. Nicholson. The deceased emigrated from Aberdeen, Scotland, about fifty years ago. He was engaged in farming and fishing.
