Signor Bonomi, one of the Panama Canal engineers, who was in New Orleans recently, said the work would begin on the canal on a large scale about July 1.

The London Economist says that any reduction of wages in England in 1894 was more than offset by the fall of prices, and that on the whole it was a year of prosperity for the poor.

A telephone wire is carried a mile and a half without support over Lake Wallen, between Quinten and Murg, in the Canton of St. Gallen, Switzerland.

Milwaukee tried the experiment of turning over the vacant land in the city limits for potato patches to be cultivated for the benefit of the poor.

GENERAL NEWS.

The Chilean budget for 1896 shows an estimated surplus of \$7,000,000.

The attempt of Jacob Bonnevie to form a new Norway and Sweden ministry has been futile.

Scott, the Lewiston, N. Y. man, who killed Sam Coulter, a hand on the Toronto steamer, has been charged with murder in the second degree.

Premier H. M. Nelson, of Queensland, has written to the Canadian Premier that Queensland is prepared to act in favor of the Pacific cable with or without the co-operation of the other colonies.

The Newfoundland loan bungle, it is said, has been straightened. The English agents of the loan have, it develops, all power in the matter of signing the bonds and seeing that they are properly issued.

Anton Metzgar, a reputed anarchist of Allegheny Pa., committed suicide by placing a bomb in his ear and then touching it off.

W. S. Brown, travelling for a New York drug firm, committed suicide at the Springfield house Montreal by taking laudanum, and died shortly after.

It is said that while on the way to Quebec, the carriages of his Excellency Lord Aberdeen were broken open and several articles of value belonging to the coachman, such as uniforms, etc., were abstracted.

Four months ago the city of Montreal was startled by the news that a prisoner named John Collins had attempted to escape from the Montreal gaol by crawling through the sewer, and it was regarded as certain that he had met his death.

A despatch from Three Rivers, Que., states that Collins is now safe in the United States.

A good deal of excitement was caused at Three Rivers on Sunday by the balloon ascension of a cow.

The man started up, hanging to the balloon, and when three hundred feet high fell into the St. Lawrence river opposite Mr. Baptist's island. He was rescued.

"Back, or I shoot!" These words were uttered by Charles E. Calkins at Malden, Mass., who the other day hung out a British flag.

Mr. Calkins had been given by a mob, an hour in which to take in the objectionable piece of bunting. He didn't take it in, defied the crowd, and as his revolver was in evidence, the flag flew till sunset.

An appeal to the police by Mr. Calkins elicited the reply that only on condition of flying the British flag under the American would protection be granted.

Mr. Calkins is a Maritime Province man and a member of the British American Society. He flies the British flag every Sunday and probably will continue to do so.

New York is soon to have the greatest bridge in the world. It will be double the size of the great Forth bridge near Edinburgh, and cost over half as much again.

The Forth bridge is 300 feet high with a span of 1,595 feet, and cost \$16,000,000. The projected Hudson river bridge is to be hung on towers 557 feet high, with foundations sunk 125 feet deep; the space between the towers is to be 3,110 feet and the cost of the structure is estimated at \$25,000,000.

This stupendous work has been planned and is to be superintended by Mr. Charles Gordon Macdonald, a Canadian engineer and a native of Ganoquoque, Ontario.
