Mr. Abe. James, who has been in Moncton and Campbellton for some time, returned to his home in Mill Creek on Monday.

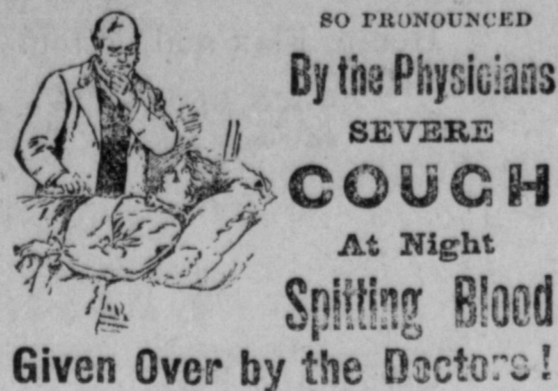
