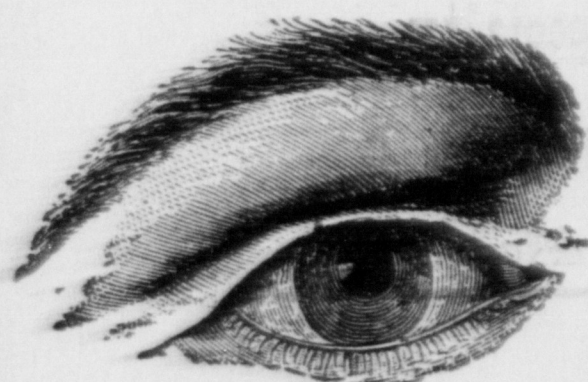

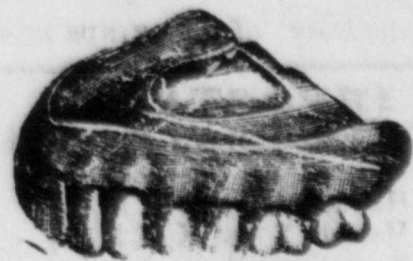

Strawberries in 365 Days.

The advice of a noted strawberry enthusiast, in regard to growing seedling strawberries is: If you wish to grow seedling strawberries and have the fewest number to discard, cut off one-third of the tip of the berry and throw it away; then take the stem of the berry in the left hand between the thumb and finger, and with a sharp knife pare off the skin of the berry just deep enough to get the seeds so as to have as little pulp as possible. Then rub the seed and pulp in dry, fine sand or cornmeal enough so as to have each seed separate (not in bunches of two three or more), and plant in the seedbed which has been previously prepared the same day. It should be well "firmed" or it will dry out too readily, and seeds and plants will perish. Sow in drills five inches apart, the seed to be an inch or more apart, and one-fourth to one-half inch deep. The seedbed should be shaded by fine brush and burlap until the little plants have their third leaves pretty well developed. If very hot and dry weather ensues after this stage of growth, they should be screened from the sun from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m. When the leaves get as large as a quarter of a dollar, they should be planted in the fruiting bed one foot apart, and carefully cultivated; or, better still, be mulched with spent hotbed manure. In all stages of growth they must not be allowed to suffer for lack of moisture, or failure will result. By following the above directions you will have seedling strawberries in 365 days or less.

Dog Feeding a Horse.

Here is a story from the Field. It may amuse both horse and dog lovers. It seems well authenticated, being vouched for by the Chief Constable of Exeter. He writes: "Knowing that you are in the habit of publishing any properly authenticated and interesting anecdotes about dogs, horses, and other animals I venture to send you the following, trusting you will think it worth reproducing in the Field. A merchant in this city (Exeter), who keeps horses for the purposes of his trade, is also the owner of a Dalmation dog, now about twelve months old, who sleeps in a stall with one of the horses, the two animals evidently being peculiarly fond of each other. During the recent winter a quantity of carrots have been kept in a covered hamper in another part of the stable, and for some time one of the horse attenders noticed that these carrots disappeared more rapidly than they ought to have done. He expected a thief, so kept watch, much to his astonishment, found the culprit to be the Dalmation dog, and not a biped, leave his bed by the horse in the stall, make his way to the hamper, deftly push it open and extract one of the carrots. The Witch Tragedy.

DUBLIN, July 5.—Michael Cleary, of Ballyvadler, near Clonmel, was convicted of manslaughter today in causing the death of his wife, Bridget Cleary, at Ballyvadler on March 14 last by burning her and otherwise ill-treating her on the ground that she was bewitched.

The so-called Clonmel witch tragedy is one of the most remarkable in the annals of crime in Ireland.

Michael Cleary, husband of the deceased, Patrick Boland her father, William Patrick, Michael and James Kennedy cousins, Mary Kennedy aunt, and Patrick Dunne, William Ahearn and Dennis Ganney, the latter known as the "family doctor" were jointly arrested and charged with burning and ill-treating Mrs. Bridget Cleary, until death relieved her from further suffering.

The evidence showed that Mrs. Cleary was suffering from nervousness and bronchitis and that her husband, believing her to be bewitched, forced a nauseous decoction of herbs down her throat for the purpose of exorcising the evil spirit. After this the unfortunate woman was held over a fire and dreadfully burned until she declared in the name of God that she was not Cleary's wife.

This torture was repeated, and in the end her husband knocked her down stripped off her clothing, poured paraffine over her body lighted it and the woman was burned to death in the presence of her relatives. Cleary claimed that he was not burning his wife but a witch.
