Daniel Young, of Galloway, has been visiting friends in this vicinity.

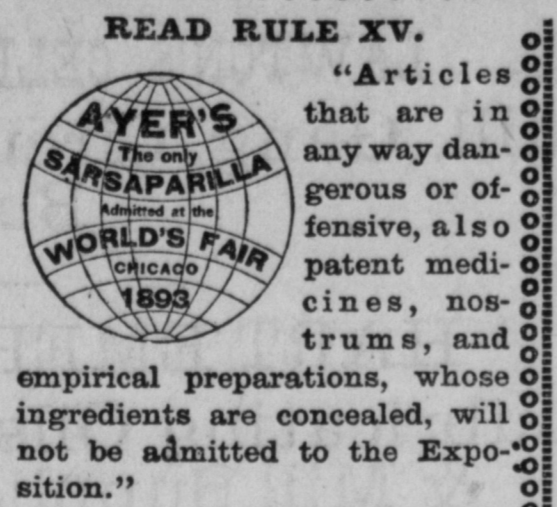
The river has been covered with mud-diggers. Some of the farmers prefer two legged mules instead of horses to lift the shells.

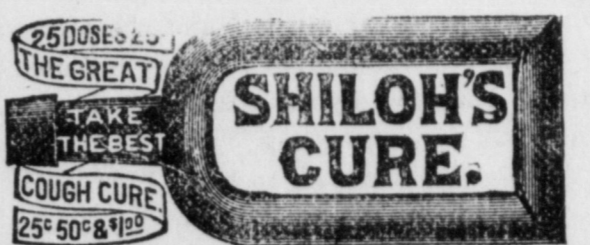
