

GENERAL NEWS.

Harry T. Hayward, convicted of the murder of Katharine Ging, of Minneapolis, Minn., was sentenced to be hanged.

The New York Assembly passed the concurrent resolution submitting to a vote of the people the question of woman suffrage.

Immense fields of petroleum have been discovered seventy miles north of Fort Saskatchewan, and the Dominion Government has promised to assist in their development.

John Hussey, while offering prayer in a Methodist prayer meeting at Montego Bay, N. S., suddenly stopped and exclaiming, "Lord I am dying," fell to the floor and expired.

John and William Hendershot have been found guilty, at St. Thomas, Ont., of murdering Wm. Henry Hendershot in December last for life insurance, and will be hanged on June 18.

A terrible hurricane swept over the Fiji Islands a few weeks ago. Great damage was done in Suva, the capital of Fiji, and the coconut and banana plantations were almost entirely destroyed.

Mustapha, the Turkish soldier who, while intoxicated, recently ran amuck through the streets of Constantinople, killing two men and wounding ten others, was found guilty of murder and sentenced to death.

The Secretary of the Manitoba Dairy Association has sent to the Minister of Agriculture a vote of thanks passed at the annual meeting for the valuable instructions given by Dairy Commissioner Robertson.

Charles Frederic Worth, the famous man dressmaker, is dead. He was seventy years of age, born in Bourne, Lincolnshire, but made fame and fortune in Paris, whither he went when he was twenty-one years of age.

The P. P. A. executive at Toronto has issued a circular, which is being scattered broadcast over the country, protesting against interference on the part of the Dominion government with the Manitoba school question.

W. A. Clark, the Montana mine owner, is building a million dollar palace in New York. His fortune is estimated at from \$20,000,000 to \$40,000,000. Thirty years ago Mr. Clark arrived in Montana with a pick on his shoulder.

The general term of the Supreme Court New York, has reversed the judgment convicting Erastus Wiman of forgery in the second degree on which he was sentenced to five years and six months in the state prison, and granted a new trial.

The verdict rendered by the coroner's jury, on the death of Robert Hewson, which occurred at London, Ont., a few days ago, is to the effect the body was placed on the track after the man had been rendered insensible by some person or persons unknown.

Three thousand pounds of nitro-glycerine exploded at the Hancock Chemical Works near Dollar Bay, Me., at 12:30 Friday afternoon. All the buildings of the company were wrecked. The employees were at dinner. One man was killed and several men injured by flying debris.

Wm. Haven, of Norwalk, Conn., left a bottle of whiskey on the dining-room table when he went home drunk Thursday morning. His son, James, aged 5, and his daughter, Marguerite, aged 4, found the whiskey and drank it. The boy died of convulsions; the girl is considered critically ill.

ALFRED, Me., Mar. 13.—Leroy Fernald the East Lebanon murderer awaiting trial for killing his mother with an axe and setting fire to the house in which her body lay, died in the county jail at Alfred, Me., on Wednesday last. He literally starved himself to death, having refused to take any nourishment for a week.

On Saturday Mrs. Colinsky and daughter started to walk from Monmouth mine, Pa., to Mount Pleasant, where they intended to purchase tickets for Hungary. They had \$500 when they left Monmouth and on Wednesday their bodies were found concealed in a brush heap at the roadside. They had been robbed and frightfully beaten.

The Grand Orange Lodge of British Columbia, which is in session at Nanaimo, on Wednesday, adopted a resolution unanimously calling on all Orangemen to support only those candidates who positively oppose separate schools in Manitoba and condemning the continuance of French as an official language in the North-West.

James a Doherty, aged 17, is in custody at Boston, charged with setting the fire discovered in a waste basket in the St. Peter's church, Dorchester, on the evening of March 6. He is said to have confessed and that he was animated purely by a spirit of mischief, and a desire to experience the excitement of the arrival and work of the fire engines.

A despatch from Shanghai, says it is reported that Li Hung Chang, the Chinese peace envoy, has been instructed to consent to the payment of an indemnity, and the cession of the territory already occupied by the Japanese in addition to the Island of Formosa. He is also instructed to consent to the surrender of the remainder of the vessels belonging to the

Chinese southern squadron, which is now hiding at Nankin.

The Tribuna, the most widely circulated of the newspapers of Rome, says that in Italy's remonstrance against the killing of Italian subjects in Colorado the United States government opposes the plea of the independence of the States comprising the Union, and advises Italy to await the decision of the Colorado judiciary. The paper adds that it is the duty of the federal government to prevent the separate states from becoming asylums for assassins.

A serious riot took place on Sunday in the Illinois State Home for Juvenile Female Offenders in Chicago. Thirty-four girls, ranging in age from ten to eighteen years, overpowered the matron and her assistants, broke windows, and smashed furniture, till the police had to be called in. The girls say they were treated with great cruelty, and complained in particular of being chained to the floor of a small dark room and kept on starvation diet.

The Moorish steamer that went out in search of the missing Spanish warship Reina Regente, has returned to Tangier, and reports she found no trace of that vessel. While she was cruising, the Moorish steamer rescued 11 men from the Spanish bark Luz, Capt. Jardon, from Brunswick, Ga., Feb. 4, for Palma, Majorca, which was wrecked during the recent storm. The men had been afloat four days in an open boat when they were picked up.

The bill to confer franchise on spinsters and widows with property qualifications was discussed in the Nova Scotia House of Assembly on Wednesday and after a very animated debate was given a three months' hoist. The bill was introduced by a private member of the House and the opposition to it was led by Attorney General Longley in an extremely able speech. The vote was 21 against the bill and 12 for it. Last year's bill was defeated by only three votes.

Information is wanted of the relatives of one Dan McNeil, who is supposed to have belonged to Nova Scotia or New Brunswick, and whose remains were recently found in British Columbia by Indians. As far as known McNeil had \$1,000 deposited in the bank at Calgary. The deceased was of short stature, dark complexion, and was not in good health for some time before his death. Further particulars concerning McNeil may be had by writing to Mrs. Benj. Franklin, Clytosin, Costez Island, B. C.

The number of the Pall Mall Budget containing the obituary and portraits of the late Czar, and also an article, "The Story of the Czars," by Mr. Albert Vaudan, was excised by the Russian censor before the magazine was delivered in St. Petersburg. All the pages on which the articles referred to appeared were cut out of the magazine, and in consequence many protests have been received from subscribers. The reported intention of the new Czar to allow more liberty to the press in Russia by abolishing the censorship has come to nothing.

By the breaking of a floor in a small house, three miles east of Fostoria, Mich., during the funeral services of Mrs. J. Thompson, the living and dead were piled together in a promiscuous heap. The body was laid out in the parlor of the house and the services had been nearly completed when, without warning, the entire floor gave away, and all the occupants with the corpse, two stoves in which fires were burning, and the furniture of the room, were precipitated into the cellar eight feet below. The coffin was split open by the fall and the body of the dead woman was scratched and bruised. Four persons were seriously injured.

LONDON, March 15.—The strange explosion that took place to-day near Fenchurch street railroad station, this city, it appears now, killed a man employed by Newton and Co., a firm of opticians. He was standing near a bookstore at the railroad station mentioned, when there was a tremendous explosion, and the man was literally blown to pieces. The houses around the station were shaken, and the station itself was damaged. A person who was standing near the man who was killed was slightly injured. Later, it transpired that the man was carrying, under instructions from his employers, a box containing magic lantern slides and a long iron gas-holder. It is supposed that it was the latter which dropped from his hand and exploded.

A Boston woman of an investigating turn of mind started out the other day to discover why physicians begin their prescriptions with the letter 'R.' According to the traveller she found out, but it took time and caused her some trouble. It seems that during the middle ages, when astrology was in fashion, a character very much like our 'R' was the sign of Jupiter the preserver of health. The physicians being then equally devoted to the science of medicine and astrology, invariably began their prescriptions with the following words: "In the name of Jupiter take the following doses in the order set down hereinafter." In the course of time this formula was abbreviated, until at present only the letter 'R' remains to teach us that the medical art was once associated with the science of the stars.
