

LONDON, March 15 .- The strange explosion that took place to-day near Fenchurch street railroad station, this city, it appears now, killed a man employed by Newton and Co., a firm of opticians. The houses around the station were shaken, and the station itself was damaged. A person who was standing near the man who was killed was slightly injured. It is supposed that it was the latter which dropped from his hand and exploded.
