CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editor of the Review:

The "Monteur Acadien," of the 15th inst., publishes a notice signed by O. J. LeBlanc, Basil Johnson and Pierre H. Leger—who call themselves a committee—calling on the French electors of each School District in the County, to select delegates to meet at Buctouche, on Saturday next, for the purpose of choosing a French candidate for the coming Federal election.

To an ordinary, every day citizen of this County it is natural to ask: who gave these three persons the right or authority to call such a Convention. One of them is quite a respectable man; the others well known to be lacking in common sense and judgment, and minus any credit, political or otherwise, in this County. Is it not rather a cheeky piece of business, for such characters to assume control of the political rights of the yeomanry of Kent? At their call forsooth! A committee by your leave! The impertinence of some folk is as wild and wide as their dreams.

And why should the Convention be a French Convention? This public notice is that politics are to be run on national lines in Kent, if our three worthies can accomplish it. In other places, Liberal or Conservative Conventions are called, and nominate party candidates. An English speaking Liberal or Conservative is prevented from attending this Buctouche Convention. He is excluded from choosing the candidate. How can he afterwards be consistently asked to vote for a man whom he is positively prevented from choosing. Is it assumed by Messrs. LeBlanc, Johnson and Leger that the English speaking people have no political rights, privileges or interests in Kent? Are they to be regarded as the Egyptian Fellahin or the Russian Serfs? I cannot be persuaded that any considerable portion of our intelligent French fellow-citizens will join in drawing a political dividing line between the English and French in this County. Such a course is foreign to the spirit of our institutions and the genius of our Country. It will not succeed, because the people have common sense; neither shall it be in order to thank the triple-alliance of LeBlanc, Johnson and Leger for its failure. We will see what we will see.

A Complete Tragedy.

The Wilna papers report a shocking drama enacted in that city a few days ago, says the London News. A man who as a youth, had emigrated to the United States many years ago, and there amassed a considerable fortune, returned a fortnight back. His appearance was so much changed that his old neighbors, with one exception, failed to recognize their youthful acquaintance. This exception was an old friend of the family, who was leaving Wilna on a short absence by a departing train just as the young man alighted. Finding himself unrecognized, the young man spent a few days loitering about his old haunts and picking up information of his father and sister, the latter a very pretty girl, whom her brother had left as a mere child.

One evening he went to his father's house during the latter's absence. His sister was greatly attracted by the strange guest who had so many interesting experiences to relate, and they supped together. The brother, feigning fatigue, begged to be allowed to remain over night, as he had something of importance to say to the girl's father in the morning. The sister though somewhat surprised at the request consented, and prepared his sleeping apartment. On her father's late return the girl informed him of their unexpected guest, and dilated, unfortunately, on the stranger's wealth. The old man's cupidity was aroused, and during the night he stole into the guest's bedroom and murdered him in his sleep with an axe.

During the next day the old neighbor now returned, who had recognized the young man at the railway station, came with a number of friends to hear news of their emigrant relatives in the states.

"Where is your son?" he inquired of the murderer. "Whose son?" asked the latter, with a blanched face. "Your own boy," said the neighbor, "who returned some days ago, and has made a fortune. Did he not sleep here last night?" Suddenly the horrible truth flashed upon the unhappy father, who rushed off to the scullery, where his son's body was hidden. He is now in prison but it is said his reason is shaken.

Further Details of the Ill-treatment of Armenians.

LONDON, March 16.—The Telegraph has a despatch sent from Moosh at a date not given and forwarded last Thursday. It says: "Commissioners have learned that the Armenian priest, Hatoonador, and his son were ordered by gendarmes to sign a document ascribing the massacre to Kurds and clearing the Turks of all blame. The Hatoonadors refused to do so. The gendarmes then placed heated triangles around their necks. The commission desire to examine the two victims, but they are too ill. The Turkish government tried every means to compel the survivors of massacres to return to their respective villages and rebuild the huts. They promised money, seed, corn, exemption from taxes and restitution of property. Nearly all refused and consequently were terribly treated. Some returned and now are literally starving, if not dead. Many who were wealthy and respected are now in abject poverty." The correspondent quotes an instance of villagers being virtually naked and subsisting on millet seed. The stock of this seed, he says, must have given out a fortnight ago. These people have no hope of help, he says, and probably are dying or dead. "If assistance be sent through delegates in Moosh, or American missionaries in Bitlis," continues the correspondent, "some lives may be saved." He writes of six daughters of the victims of the massacre who returned to Semal half naked and died without food or fire in a hut during a snow storm. He names six villages where the few survivors of the massacre are starving.

Lord Kimberley, minister of foreign affairs, has refused to receive a deputation which called upon him to enlist his official-sympathy with a movement to inquire into the treatment of Christian prisoners in Turkish jails.

Lo! The Poor Editor.


