DROWNING ACCIDENT.—On Wednesday, about 11 o'clock, Peter McDonald, who was collecting salmon for A. & R. Loggie, was drowned off Bartibogue. A squall struck his boat which filled and sank. He got hold of a small boat which he had with him, but unfortunately it was bottom up and he was unable to keep his hold very well, and before help could reach him he let go. His employers immediately sent their S. S. Eva and a number of men to grapple for the body, but up till Thursday evening had not succeeded. Much sympathy is felt for the bereaved parents.

SUDDEN DEATH.—Mrs. James Donaher, an old and respected resident of Kingston died at her home, Sunday morning after a very short illness. Mrs. Donaher, who usually enjoyed good health had worked in her garden on Saturday and felt as well as usual. She retired about 10 o'clock p. m. About midnight she awoke and called her daughter Emma and her son H. P. She complained of a pain in the region of the heart. Dr. Olloqui was summoned as soon as possible, but before the doctor arrived life was extinct. Heart failure was the cause of death. Mrs. Donaher was twice married. Her first husband was Dennis O'Conner her second husband, who is also dead was James Donaher. She leaves 8 children. She was 70 years old. The remains were interred in the Kingston R. C. Cemetery yesterday.

RICHARD.—At St. Louis, on the 22nd inst., Vital Richard, aged 44 years, leaving a widow and 2 young children to mourn their loss.

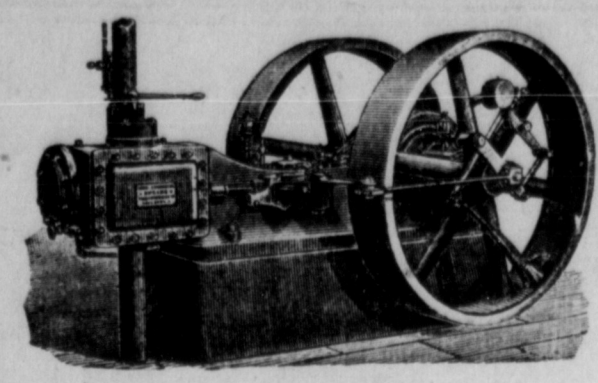
