THE SITUATION.

Beyond question the government has been defeated at the polls, by the vote of Quebec, while outside of that province there is a fairly equal division of the votes. The result in the great French-speaking province is a surprise to both parties. It is probably largely due to the race feeling and the admiration with which Mr. Laurier has inspired his compatriots. Outside of Montreal and a few smaller centres in Quebec province the National Policy had not taken so strong a hold upon the people as in other provinces.

It should not be forgotten that after one party has held power for a great length of time there comes naturally into the minds of many people a desire for a change, and on general principles, it is better that there should be occasional changes of control in our public affairs. This desire for change has been an unmistakable factor in producing the result which we see.

It is not at all likely that a change of administration at Ottawa will result in any sudden or alarming reversion of the fiscal and trade policy of the country. When the Liberal party was last in power in 1878, the so-called revenue tariff of the time included a general range of at least 25 per cent. duties on manufactures. The large indebtedness since incurred for the creation of important public works—railways, canals and harbor improvements—renders it now impracticable to lower the tariff below 20 to 25 per cent. Some years ago the Conservative government in pursuance of the avowed policy of "lopping off some mouldering branches" of the N. P., reduced the duties on several lines, bringing many agricultural implements down to a rate of 20 per cent. duty. The manufacturers have not greatly complained of this, and further changes in the same direction have been in contemplation. So that in one sense both parties had been moving in the same direction.

If the incoming government are wise they will take account of the fact that the slight majority they have obtained in Ontario was obtained on the school question rather than the trade policy, and therefore does not afford any warrant, so far as that province is concerned, for any extreme tariff changes. We venture that with so astute a politician as Sir Oliver Mowat at his side Mr. Laurier may deem it proper to take a very moderate course in tariff matters.

STATE OF THE CANADIAN PAPER TRADE.

Canada appears to have got her industries into a comfortable position under her present National Policy. One of the Canadian journals prints a statement to the effect that the proprietors of a newspaper published in the United Kingdom communicated with the Dominion Government, asking to be put in the way of securing a supply of paper from Canadian manufacturers. It is alleged that inquiry developed the fact that Canadian manufacturers of newspaper declined to take the order on the ground that their output was fully contracted for. Truly this must be a pleasant condition of affairs for our paper-making friends across the border, and we most sincerely congratulate them that it exists. Thus do we have another exemplification of the wisdom of keeping home industries employed. Sir Charles Tupper declares himself positively in favor of the policy of protecting the industries of his country, a declaration which must be gratifying not only to the paper-making interests of Canada but to all other industries which it would be to the advantage of the Dominion to foster. We cannot and should not in this country find fault with the announcement. The issue has always been regarded by us as one of paramount importance, and it is in line with the industrial development of any country possessed of natural resources which can be made to bring in abundant returns when the assurance of stability in the conditions of manufacture is given—Paper Trade Journal.

THE RIGHT TO APPOINT.

The right of Sir Charles Tupper's cabinet to make appointments after being convened at the polls is strongly called in question by the Liberal press, especially the proposed appointment to the Senate. Just before the election Hon. Messrs. Angers and Desjardins resigned their seats in the Senate to run for the commonwealth and were defeated, leaving vacant seats which were former Liberal strongholds. It is quite natural that Sir Charles Tupper might feel disposed to restore them to their former positions. The objections taken to this action are first, a general denial of the right of a defeated cabinet to make any appointments, and secondly the fact that the Senate as now constituted is overwhelmingly Conservative.

As to these objections it may be answered generally that no appointments can be made to any position of prominence without the governor's general concurrence and signature. Lord Aberdeen is an imperial officer, quite above and beyond party control in Canada, and he will no doubt be guided by the best British and colonial precedents. What His Excellency will do we know not, but the St. John Sun has pointed out that when the McKenzie government was overwhelmingly defeated at the polls in September, 1878, they continued in office for a month afterward and made a number of appointments which the governor general of that time duly sanctioned. If this is true it would constitute a precedent which it would be hard now to get over.

DOMINION DAY.

As there were not sufficient entries, the sailing race which had been advertised, did not come off. Most of the boatmen seemed afraid to risk any money on their boats. As the people who expected to see a race would have been disappointed, the hand people offered to hang up a \$5.00 purse to be sailed for, no entrance fee to be charged, and open to all boats. This offer brought the following boats to the starting place.

A strong northwest breeze was blowing and the boats started with reefed sails. The race was twice over a four mile course. After the first round, only four boats continued the race which was won by Robt. C. 1st, Lightning, 2nd, U. & I., 3rd and George C. 4th. The race occupied one hour. There was no rowing race. The 100 yd foot race was won by John Shaddock 1st, John Thibodeau, 2nd, and Wm. Whalen, 3rd. The time was 11 1/2 seconds.

The picnic was a grand success. All seemed to enjoy themselves. Lanching was kept up until the "wee sma' hours." Upwards of 3 hundred dollars were realized.

Col. Demville has won in Kings by a large majority over his opponent, Judge Merton, and is now in a position to claim anything he may desire from the position of minister of militia down. The gallant colonel is no doubt the best cavalry officer in Canada. He comes of a fighting stock, and he has won for the Liberals a seat which had been continuously held by the Conservatives since 1867. He is immensely popular, and hosts of old friends both Conservative and Liberal will be glad to learn of his further advancement.

One of the measures to which the Liberal party stands committed on coming to power is to hold a plebiscite on the question of liquor prohibition. As we understand it they propose to submit to the entire electorate of Canada, for a yes or no vote, whether they desire the total prohibition by law of the importation, manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors. And if the majority vote yes, Mr. Laurier stands pledged to introduce the required legislation. This is a pretty important contract, inasmuch as the majority are reasonably sure to vote for prohibition, and the loss of the revenue from liquor, which must follow, would be a matter of millions.

The withdrawal of the objection bill from before the British parliament is a reminder that the old country has a school question as well as Canada to deal with.
