ACCIDENT AT ST. JOHN.—Two men, James Carleton, of Carleton, and James Gleason, of Milford, fell from the top of the chimney of Messrs. Miller & Woodman's Mill, St. John, Monday, and were buried under a pile of bricks and mortar that came down with them. Strange to say neither were fatally injured. Gleason was cut in the back of the head and Carleton had two small cuts.

THE FIRST ARRIVAL.—Mr. D. McAlpion's schooner, Maggie Roach, Capt. Irving, arrived from Picton on Tuesday, with a cargo of coal for Mr. G. W. Roberson. The vessel sailed last week for Charlottetown with lumber, thence to Picton for coal. She made the round trip in 8 days. The Roach has this voyage, two cargoes ahead of any of the other coasters. Capt. Irving reports considerable ice in the straits.

DEATH OF HON. T. W. ANGLIN.—Hon. Timothy Warren Anglin, chief clerk of the Surrogate Court, died at his residence in Toronto Sunday morning, aged 74. Mr. Anglin was well known throughout New Brunswick, having for years been one of the leading citizens. He was born and educated in Ireland, coming out to St. John in 1848. He established the Freeman newspaper, of which he was editor and proprietor down to 1877, when it was destroyed in the great fire. Mr. Anglin sat for St. John county in the N. B. assembly from 1861 to 1866, when he was defeated on the Confederation question to which he was opposed. He was a member of the executive under Mr. Smith, (afterwards Sir Albert) for a few months in 1866. After the union he was returned for Gloucester County and on the accession of the Mackenzie government to power in 1874 he was elected Speaker. Mr. Anglin was defeated in 1878 and shortly afterwards removed to Ontario, where he received an appointment from the Massey government.

Mr. J. de Wolf Spurr, of St. John, was in town this week.


Mrs. A. B. Carson, of Kingston, is recovering from her recent severe illness.

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
