Stanley and Mountney Jephson, the only white survivors of the expedition for the relief of Emin Pasha, have just erected a brass tablet in Kilmore Church to the memory of their comrade, Surgeon Park.

George Moore, a working miner of Grand Ronde, Wash., celebrated his one hundred and second birthday on December 20. He is in perfect health, and does as good a day's work at his place as many of the younger miners.

A court in Wilmington, Del., recently puzzled over the meaning of "solid gold" in a contract. Some jewellers, called as experts, said the expression means gold above fourteen carats fine; others pure gold.

Congressman Mozely, of Missouri, is but 28 years old, but he ought to be broad and statesmanlike in his views, for his district reaches across the southern part of the State, 240 miles from side to side.

A railway round Mount Etna, about 62 miles in length, has recently been opened for passenger traffic. It will not concern tourists much, as it is mainly intended to tap the rich agricultural district which fringes the mountains.

Paderewski's invalid son is said to be an unusually brilliant boy despite his hopelessly invalid condition. He is much further advanced in his studies than the average child of 12, having mastered four languages.

In the tank of the steamer Hermann, which arrived at Hull from Buenos Ayres on Thursday, were found fifteen stowaways. Six were dead and the remaining nine insensible and would have died in a few hours.

It brings back the days of the Algerine corsairs to read that the Cardinal Prefect of the Propaganda distributed 200,000 francs last year for the ransom of slaves from captivity. The money was spent by Catholic missionaries in the interior of Africa.

By a decree the Portuguese Government has forbidden the manufacture of wines, either simple or mixed, from the residuum of grapes, sugar, raisins and concentrated must, or their shipment, and sale, in order to favor the sale of genuine wines.

The new form of the popular loan presented to the consideration of the Senate on Tuesday in a bill provides for an issue of postal savings notes of a face value of \$100, with interest thereon at the rate of

\$3 a year, with total interest of 16 if the notes are not presented at the expiration of five years. After five years, in addition to \$16 the government is to pay \$4 for each year's interest. These notes may be issued in sums of \$50, redeemable at the pleasure of the government after five years.

In the Senate Tuesday Mr. Chandler declared if the President and Attorney General did their duty, Joseph Pulitzer, editor of the New York World, would be prosecuted if he ever set foot on American soil. There is a statute making it illegal for citizens of the United States to correspond with foreign governments and officials in regard to public measures in the United States and Mr. Chandler declared this law applied to the Pulitzer telegram to the Prince of Wales on the Venezuela question.

In reply to a request that he sign an address of the British literary men to American authors, asking the latter to do all in their power to prevent war between Great Britain and the United States, Alfred Austin, the new poet laureate, writes professing admiration and respect for the American government and people saying their recent attitude was unfair and unfriendly. He therefore at the present moment cannot approve of a body of Englishmen addressing a body of Americans in language which might be construed as savoring of timorous complaisance.
