

## Sunday School News.

Rev. A. Lucas, Field Secretary, has been in Kent Co for the past week and more.

Dundas and St. Mary's district held its Convention at Hicksville on Friday the 3rd inst. Revs. Messrs Ramsay and Normandy were present to help. President H. A. West occupied the chair and spoke vigorously and cheerfully. The Field Secretary spoke of "The Duties of the S. Sch. Teacher"—using Blackboard in his illustrations. Messrs Ramsay and Normandy took part in the discussions. "The importance of Teaching Temperance in S. Sch." was spoken of by Messrs Ramsay, Normandy and Geddes.

The Field Secy. spoke on "the helpfulness of Parish Conventions" removing some misapprehension which existed.

The whole Association work was explained. Illustrations were given from practical experience in other Parishes. Rev. Mr. Normandy spoke on "Some qualifications of Sunday Sch. workers." The Sessions were very profitable.

Sunday Jan. 5th was spent by Field Secy. with the schools at Scovill's Mills and Scotch Settlement, a new year's Sermon was preached to young people at Scovill's Mills in the evening.

Wellington Parish Convention met at Little River on Monday Jan. 6th. Sixty persons were present in the afternoon. Rev. Mr. Ramsay led the exercises and Dr. King occupied the chair and spoke of the importance of the work. Reports were received from Supts. Some noted advance in their work. More teachers present would have added to the interest of the meeting. The Field Secy. gave counsel to Supts and made suggestions for better work. Rev. Mr. Vans who was present gave a valuable address on "the qualifications of the teacher." Mr. Lucas gave a normal Lesson on Luke's gospel. Workers were urged to spread the "Evangel" among all families possible. The evening session was opened with Bible reading. A normal Lesson was given on "Sunday School and Home Life." "Temperance in Sunday Sch." was spoken to by Mr. Kay, Mr. Ayer and Mr. T. Gamble. The Field Secy. also dwelt on this and the Home Dept. was expounded. The Convention here was very helpful.

On the evening of Jan. 7th. the Field Secy. held a meeting at Little Creek. His address was on the "needs, advantages, and methods of modern S. Sch. work." The people were exhorted to attend their Parish Conventions—a good account is expected of this locality in the future. Many of the people know the value of these meetings.

A meeting was held on evening of 8th., at East Galloway for the first time. The school here is not open in Winter. The Secretary urged the reopening or at least the Home Department. A good report is expected from Mr. Main next year as for some time he has been a warm supporter of Convention work. Mr. Girvan will do all in his power to assist.

Richibucto Parish held its convention in the Presby'n Ch., Richibucto, on Jan. 9th., Rev. Mr. Hamilton was present and led the devotional exercises. The Supts. reported their schools. Some pleasing indications of advance were noted. One school was still open which had only formerly been kept open 7 months. Two Schs hold teachers' meetings—one has teachers prayermeetings. Some report parents not interested and poor attendance.

Rev. Mr. Hamilton spoke of the interesting school at Kent Jctn., which had been overlooked in last year's report by County Secretary.

The evening Session was opened with

Bible Reading by Mr. Lucas, Rev. Mr. Hamilton presided, Rev. Mr. Allen gave a brief address. Secretary—Miss Bowser, read the minutes. Mr. Lucas gave a few Normal Hints on "preparation by the S. S. Teacher." There had been no programme prepared and the enthusiasm of the Convention did not seem up to the average. On the evening of Jan. 10th a meeting was held at Molus River. There is no Sunday Sch. here at present. County Secy. Rev. F. W. Murray led the meeting. Rev. Mr. Lucas gave a Blackboard address upon the "claims of the S. Sch. on all Christians. The School will be reopened here in the Spring. In the meantime the Home Department is to be vigorously pushed. Miss Eleanor Warman has been taking steps in this direction already in connection with the school at Bass River Point—classes will meet in Mr. John Warman's house for the Winter. There should be a Sunday Sch. near Mr. Stephen Ward's, at the School House at an early date. Mr. Joseph Miller proposes to form Home Study Classes immediately.

On Sunday Mr. Lucas addressed large congregations at Bass River, West Branch, and Molus River. A deep interest was manifested in all these services,—the one at Molus River in the evening was especially impressive—good results are visible already.

The school at Main River, Mr. George Lawson Supt., will remain open all winter. One of the teachers in this school, Mrs. W. W. Graham is also Secretary of the I. B. R. A. and is doing a good work. Pine Ridge School is still open and it is hoped it will be evergreen—Robt. McNulty is Supt. here.

Mrs. T. McWilliams, Ford's Mills has organized Home Study classes with over 30 members. Who will be heard from next? Mr. H. A. West, Cocagne, is also opening a Home Department. What is your school doing in this line, reader? Can you do anything? Have you ever tried?

Jan. 13th. The Parish Convention at Harcourt met this p. m., the County Secy was there with Mr. Lucas, President Dunn in the chair, Rev's McClure, McConnell and Murray took part in the convention. Mr. Lucas welcomed Rev. Mr. McClure on behalf of the association and stated briefly and clearly the aims, and the results of the work. Mr. Murray presented the Home Study Dept., and urged its claims. This matter was discussed and much interest manifested. A number of Supts. and teachers were present. The Co. Secy could not stay to the evening session, but the afternoon session was the best ever held in Harcourt. It was held in the Methodist Church whose pastor, Rev. J. W. McConnell, was present to welcome to his pretty little church, those who came, with a cordial hand shake. To-night there will be a full church.

Collections at all the foregoing meetings were as follows: McLaughlin Road, 77c; Scovill's Mills, 43c; Little River, \$2.16; McNairn, \$1.10; East Galloway no collection was taken but a good contribution was forwarded some time ago by Mr. Main; Richibucto, \$4.00; Molus River, \$1.81; Bass River, \$2.46; West Branch, \$2.72. Harcourt will not be behind, your Secy had to leave before the offering was taken.
