TO MAKE SPOOL SQUARES.

Parliament of Canada.

OTTAWA, March 28.—According to arrangement yesterday's sitting of the House of Commons was devoted to a discussion of the exclusion since 1892 of live Canadian cattle from the United Kingdom.

Mr. Foster moved a long resolution stating that a bill is now before the Imperial Parliament which proposes to make the exclusion permanent and protesting against it because pleuro-pneumonia never has and does not now exist in Canada.

The discussion lasted till a late hour. Mr. Mulock and Sir Charles Tupper made the chief speeches.

Mr. Mulock charged the government here with ignoring the only conditions upon which they might have secured the withdrawal of the schedule, namely, compliance with the request of the Imperial authorities for an investigation in Canada.

In view of the repeated official declarations of the British government of the existence of pleuro-pneumonia amongst Canadian cattle and the serious consequences to Canadian cattle interests from the passage of the bill now before the British Parliament to permanently exclude Canadian live cattle from Great Britain, this House regrets the action of the government of Canada has not been such as to protect the cattle industry of Canada from the serious injury calculated to accrue to it from the passage of such a measure.

Sir Charles Tupper defended his conduct as High Commissioner and that of the government. He condemned the course of the opposition.

The debate was continued by Sir Richard Cartwright and others until after midnight when Mr. Mulock's amendment was defeated and the main motion carried.

The adjourned debate on Sir Charles Tupper's motion to go into committee on the remedial bill was resumed by Clarke Wallace, Conservative, who moved an amendment, seconded by Mr. McNeill, Conservative, that it was unwise and inexpedient to pass the bill.

Mr. McNeill said there was no moral sanction behind this bill. The vote on the second reading showed clearly that the people did not approve of the measure. Subtract the votes of the members of the government and of those gentlemen who did not intend to present themselves to the electorate again, there was no majority behind the bill.

Mr. Martin, while free to vote for the amendment, felt he could not subscribe to the declaration in amendment that the bill was absolute and irrevocable as far as parliament and legislature was concerned.

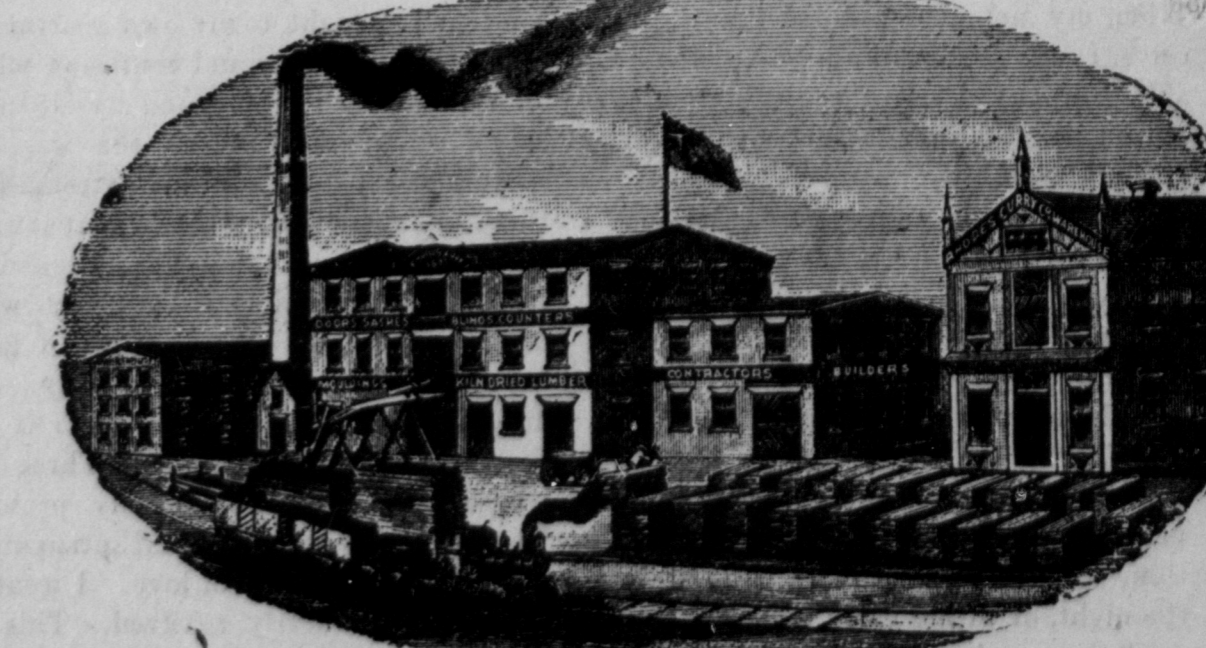
