**DOHERTY IS NOT GUILTY.**—It required time to select a jury for the trial of Joseph Doherty, for the shooting of Arthur Luke. Forty-six were called, before the twelve good men and true were chosen. Several of them confessed to having formed an opinion against the prisoner, and several were challenged peremptorily by Mr. Tweedie. The following were chosen: John Martin, Lebaron Finley, Thos. Flanagan, Chas Hays, Wm Fenton, Emanuel Fernandez, Michael Haley, Ignatius Redmond, Joseph Masterson, John McLean, Daniel Hogan and Joseph J. Savoy.

**DISEASED CATTLE.**—For some time past a disease has been noticed among the fine herd of pure bred Ayrshire cattle belonging to Messrs. J. & T. Jardine, Kingston. Last week the owners of the herd notified the Federal Government of the fact and consequently Dr. Frink the veterinary inspector was ordered to make an investigation. The doctor pronounced the disease tuberculosis. It is probable that the whole herd, a very valuable one of about twenty head will have to be destroyed. The head of the herd, the bull "Cock of the Walk" cost \$150 about a year ago.

**DEATH OF WILLIAM NOBLE.**—Mr. William Noble, fourth son of the late Robert Noble, of Hardwicke Village died at Lowell, Mass., on the 24th February, in the 64th year of his age. In his earlier days, which he spent in his native province, he was a teacher in the public schools and wherever he went his arduous labours in his profession, coupled with his kind and genial disposition won for him the esteem and love of many. For the last twenty-five years or more he has been living in the United States, where his widow and family now reside. His death which was caused by cancer in the stomach, removes from them a most loving husband and father. His remains were interred at Lowell, on the 26th February.—Advance.

**FAMOUS SCHOOL CASE.**—The famous school case of Armstrong Brook, Restigouche County, was tried at the last county court. Upwards of two years ago a distinguished teacher taught the school in this district, who was very popular with most of the people. Two of the trustees, for reasons best known to themselves, notified the teacher, in the usual form, that their engagement would cease with him at the end of the term. The notification was sent in due time, but the third trustee was not consulted in the matter as they knew that he was opposed to the dismissal of the teacher. The two trustees thought that they could act without calling a meeting of trustees. The teacher sued the trustees in corporate capacity and gained the case. He was rewarded the loss he sustained by the dismissal, the trustees also paying all expenses. This is the third case the teacher has had in connection with his dismissal, and has gained them all.

Mr. George H. Dixon, of St. John, was in town this week.

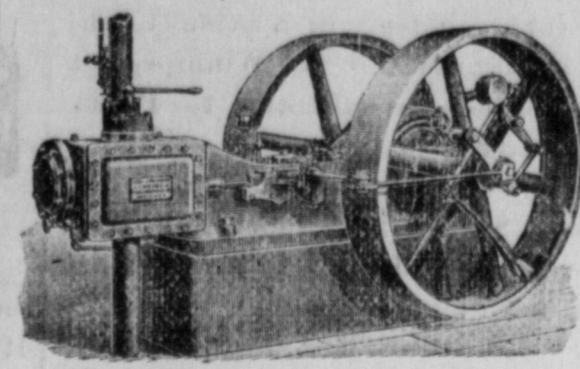
