

DISEASED CATTLE .- For some time past a disease has been noticed among the fine herd of pure bred Ayrshire cattle belonging to Messrs. J. & T. Jardine, Kingston. The doctor pronounced the disease tuberculosis. It is probable that the whole herd, a very valuable one of about twenty head will have to be destroyed.
