Lots of Sheep.
WAUSEON, Ohio, March 25.—Miss Jennie Holden, daughter of a well-to-do farmer in this county, owns 3,000 sheep but not a foot of land.

When she was 17 years old she had two sheep. It occurred to her that she could make money in the sheep business on a new plan.

With \$100 she started out to make her fortune. Her first step was to get contracts from farmers to board sheep. She furnished the sheep and they the board, and each took one-half increase at the end of the shearing season.

The increase covers the lambs born and the wool. At the end of the shearing all the least promising of the old stock were sold to butchers and the proceeds invested in younger stock.

Taking the tariff off wool cost Miss Holden severely, but she still carries on her business. She has \$15,000 in the bank and in bonds and is as sweet and pretty and popular a girl as can be found in Ohio.
