

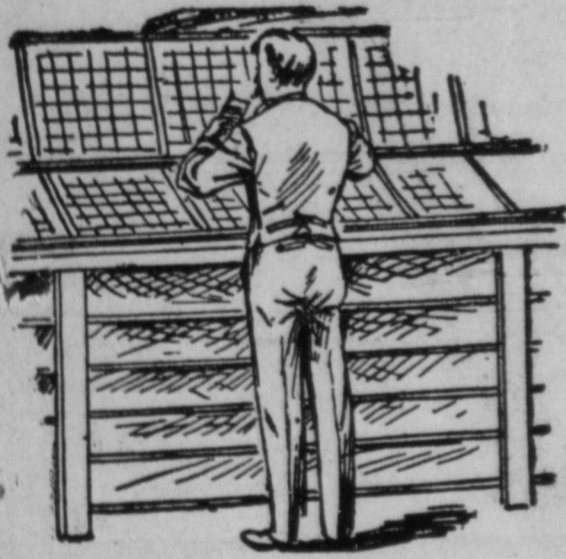
A TYPON'S RELEASE
