Mr. Trueman is an A. B. Sc. Graduate of Cornell University, and is a grandson of the late John Main, of Kingston, Kent Co. He is now a Professor in the Agricultural State College of South Dakota.

—An interesting lawsuit was held before Commissioner Cate on Monday. Mr. Thos. Foster, of Kingston sued Mr. Frank McInerney for the price of a pung which the latter had borrowed and broken. Mr. C. J. 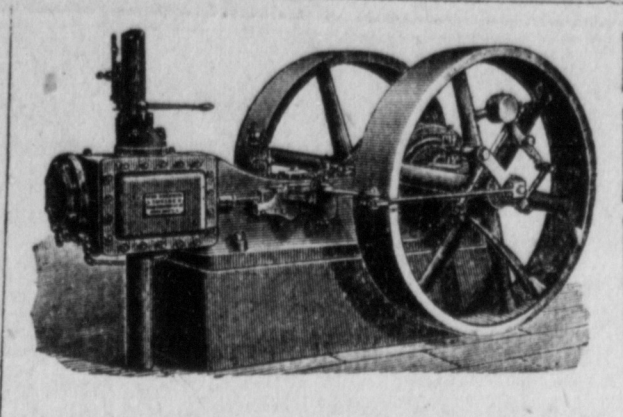
