THE WILKES-MAMBRINO STALLION "BELKAISER,"

Foaled 4th May, 1890. Bred by Dr. J. W. Day, Patchen Farm, Waterloo, New York. Color, Seal Brown, height 15.3, weight 1100 lbs. Best Trotting Stock on the top of the earth, and so acknowledged on all sides. You have the trotter without the weed. Best of legs and feet.

In giving a history of "Belkaiser" 18197, I may say to the public that a registered horse may be traced in the American Trotting Register just as readily as land can be traced in the Registry Office of Kent County, and if I should dare to falsify either the horse, his number or his breeding, the horse in my hands, or in the hands or possession of any other person would be valueless as a trotter, and I would never again be permitted to associate in any circle of trotting-association patrons, nor would any horse I should ever own be allowed to compete for stakes either in my own name or that of another, neither would I be able to sell him to another for that purpose. In the face of these facts I declare the following statements to be true, challenging contradiction.

"Belkaiser" No. 18197, foaled May 4th, 1890, is owned at present by David J. Cochran of Richibucto, Kent County, New Brunswick, was bred by Dr. J. W. Day, of the Patchen Stock Farm, Waterloo, New York, who beside being proprietor of said farm, is President of the Breeder's Association of the State of New York, and a well known writer on the trotting horse.

The following is Dr. Day's opinion of "Belkaiser":

Office of Patchen Stock Farm, Dr. J. W. Day, Proprietor, Waterloo, N. Y., March 24th, 1896.

D. J. Cochran: Dear Sir—Your Colt "Belkaiser" is a grandly bred colt, as his dam is by "Bellwood," one of the best Mambrino horses ever foaled. These blood lines are the same as have produced the best trotters of the present day. Your horse ought to trot fast if properly trained and given a chance. I took the dam of your colt to England and sold her with a colt by "K" to her side, which they say is a great one. I also sold another brother to your colt to go to California that is a very fast colt.

"Belkaiser" is registered in Vol. 11 of the American Trotting Register, now in his six year old form, his size and weight are such as to justify patrons with fair sized mares to expect large sized colts. His weight is 1100 lbs., height 15.3. His color is a handsome brown with no markings of any kind. He is an attractive-looking horse without a single element of coarseness, compactly built, and his style, spirit and easy, frictionless gait give indications that he has latent speed capacity of a high order which I intend to have cultivated at an early day. His limbs and feet are perfectly sound, and to study

them is to admire them. His back is short, strong and powerful, a characteristic of that great race family—the Wilkes. The reader's attention is directed to a careful perusal of the tabulated pedigree which tells the story of his rich inheritance of producing blood. A presentation of a few facts bearing on that pedigree may be of interest to breeders. "Belkaiser" comes of the royal house of George Wilkes. His sire, Kaiser 2200, is one of the youngest sons of the mighty George Wilkes, and was foaled in 1882, the year his sire died. He has a record of 2:28 1/2 given him by his owner Dr. Day in the third heat of a winning race. Although having only a few foals older than "Belkaiser," he has made a creditable record as a sire, being sire of

When it is considered that such stallions as Red Wilkes, Young Jim, Oward, Bourbon-Wilkes, Ambassador, Lumps, Alcantara, Aloyon, Jay Bird, Adrian Wilkes, Guy Wilkes, Simmons, Wilton, Gambetta Wilkes and Brown Wilkes are excluded from the list some idea of its greatness may be conceived.

The accompanying table will show the money winners of the United States. It can be found in the Christmas number of the Horse Breeder, New York and Boston on page 1473. Let any thinking person study the dollars and cents won in that circuit and what would be desired to breed but a cross between the George Wilkes and Mambrino stock of horses. The same dates will be repeated in June and July. A competent groom will be in attendance who will make arrangements and collect the fee of \$10.

THE WIDE WIDE WORLD.

Five children were smothered to death at Turner Falls, Mass. by fire in a four-story tenement block located at the corner of second and L streets Friday morning. Mat Mooty was hanged in Texas the other day, and the crowd was so great that the sheriff announced "Standing room only." Mr. Mooty even offered his place to anyone who would take it. At Niagara Falls, Ont., April 16, about a thousand tons of rock fell from the bank near the inclined railway on the American side early this morning, narrowly escaping the new station built at the foot of the incline.

S. charge d'affaires, Mr John W. Riddle, and the British ambassador, Sir Phillip Currie.

By means of a magnet a piece of steel was removed from the arm of a Middletown (Cl.) man at Wesleyan College the other day. The man, who is employed in a foundry, was struck by a piece of steel which buried itself in his arm, travelling up to the elbow. The removal defied medical treatment. He was taken up to the college laboratory, and a large magnet used to exactly locate it. An attempt was then made to get it out by making an incision in the arm where the steel was. This failed.
