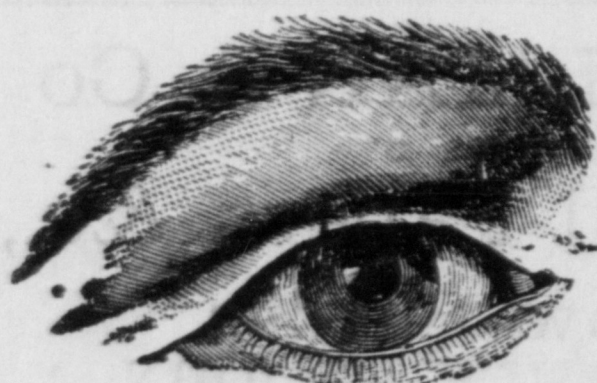

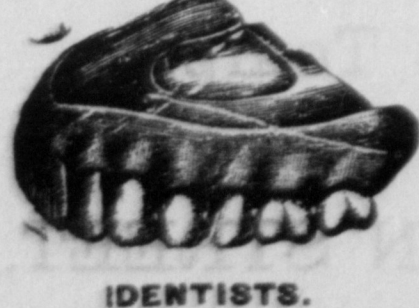

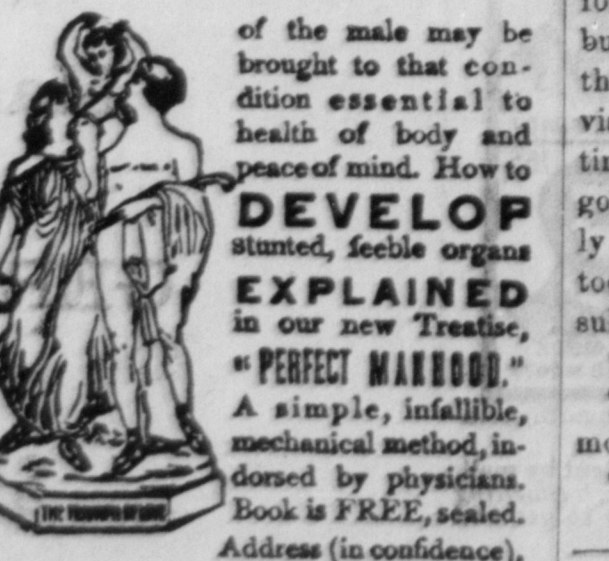

Children Cry for

Raging Torrents.

MONTREAL April, 16:—Almost incalculable damage is being done in the Eastern Township of Quebec by water rising in the rivers, due to the hot sun melting the snow. Railway bridges and tracks are washed out, houses are submerged and the employees of factories where the fires are not extinguished go to and from their work in boats.

The Quebec Central lost its great iron bridge a hundred and fifty feet long, which crosses a ravine at St. Anselme 21 miles south of Point Levis.

The ice lodged in the gorge and brought down the structure with a crash, as the falling waters rushed against the obstruction. This cuts off all communication between this section and the New England states. In the vicinity of Sherbrook the tracks of the Quebec Central the Maine Central and the Boston and Maine have been washed out in various places.

Traffic will be interrupted for weeks. Sweeping past the city of Sherbrooke the St. Francis river has burst from its confines and in a raging torrent covers the country for the distance of half a mile between that city and Richmond.

The J. J. Jones machine company works at Sherbrooke have been submerged and so rapid was the rise of the water that the employees had to be taken out in boats. Several other factories of higher ground are surrounded by water.

Riverside dwellings and warehouses are submerged. At Richmond the damage is very great. The water is several feet deep in the main street of the town. In two wards the cellars of houses are all a wash and the village of Jarnisseville is completely submerged.
