

KILLED BY HIS OWN AXE. - A peculiar and fatal accident occurred in Wellington, Yerxa's camp in township number 8 range, Aroostook county, Maine, on January 15th. Neil Campbell, a native of Bass River, Kent Co., N. B., was going to his work from the camp with his axe on his shoulder, when near the place where he expected to commence chopping his foot slipped on the ice and he fell backwards. his axe in some manner turned edge up and the young man fell on it. The axe entered a fleshy part of his body and cut in so deeply as to sever the cords and main arteries. He could not walk so he crawled on his hands and knees 60 rods, then called for help. They did not hear him for some time. Gilbert Moseroft, the foreman of the working crew, came to his rescue. A team was obtained and the sufferer borne to the camp, it was then 3 o'clock in the afternoon. The patient died at 4 o'clock before medical aid could reach him. The remains were forwarded to the residence of his cousin. Joseph Campbell, of Ludlow. 


