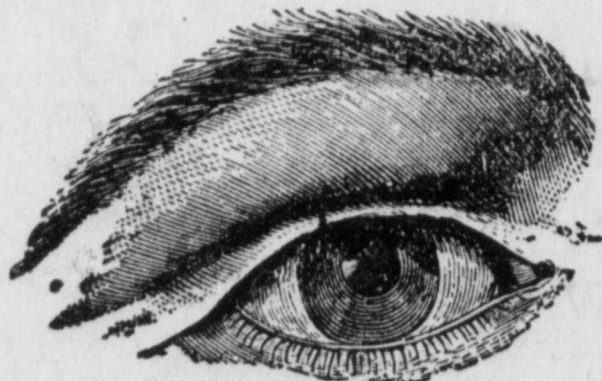

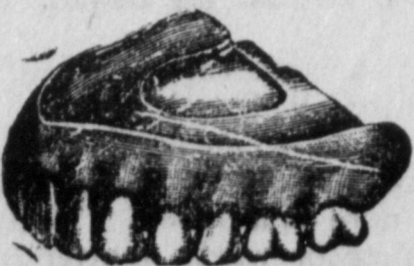

## Tesla Outdoes Edison.

Nicola Tesla, of New York, has done what all the other explorers of the Roentgen rays have failed to do. He has succeeded in looking through the human body. He has gone farther and has seen through the bodies of three of his assistants, placed in a line with the rays.

Ever since the discovery of Edison that he could see the bones of the hand through a fluorescent screen, experimenters with the X rays have been devoting their energies to trying to see through the body. The living skeleton has been photographed many times by the use of the rays. But no development of the light was found sufficiently powerful to penetrate the trunk of the body.

Edison believed that he had almost solved the problem when he discovered the fluorescent screen. In this he used tungstate of calcium, which he believed to be six times more fluorescent than the latino-bario-cyanide, which Roentgen and most of his successors used.

Tesla, on the contrary, has persevered in using the platino-bario-cyanide for his fluorescent screen, after testing almost every known substance, and some few that were not recognized previously.

The neck, the upper portion of the chest and arms and legs were found by Edison to be amenable to the rays from a powerful tube and his fluorescent screen. But the trunk of the body resisted all his attacks. Then he set about trying exhaustively to perfect the tubes.

That is exactly the work to which Tesla has devoted his energies. Throughout all his experimenting, which has added so wonderfully to the application of electricity, his one aim has been to secure great power. So it has been in his work with the X rays, whereas other scientists were using a voltage, reckoned in thousands, or even in hundreds of thousands, Tesla handled millions. His great object was to secure vast power in the vacuum tubes, and now he has succeeded.

The skeleton of one of his assistants who stood at a distance of five or six feet from the tube, which was giving off the rays, was plainly seen. Every bone stood out with perfect clearness. But that was not all.

Tesla has finally perfected the X ray tube to such an extent that he saw completely through skeleton as well as flesh. One of his assistants, who was the subject experimented on, stood with his back to the vacuum tube where the X rays were better given off. He held a brass plate in front of his chest, moving it up and down.

The X rays had penetrated the body, and through the fluorescent screen Tesla could distinctly see the brass plate as it moved up and down.

"It is true that I have succeeded in seeing through the body," said Tesla to a reporter. "Not only that, but I have seen through three men standing in a row."

The effects of this recent discovery of the electrical wizard cannot be estimated lightly. It has been the belief of physicians and surgeons ever since scientists began to exploit the Roentgen theory that their work would be enormously benefited if it were possible to photograph the human organs. Now that they will be enabled to see them the results should be many times more valuable.

## THE WIDE WIDE WORLD.

Detachment of the King's Royal Rifles, stationed at Dover and the Irish Rifles, quartered at Brighton, have been ordered to hold themselves in readiness to proceed immediately to South Africa.

The under Secretary of State for foreign affairs, Mr. Geo. M. Curzon, answering a question in the House of Commons the other day said that the negotiations with the United States regarding Venezuela were proceeding and it was not advisable to make a statement on the subject until they were concluded.

A special despatch from Gibraltar says that while Mr. A. Bulker's cutter Ailsa was becalmed off the coast of Morocco on her way to England, after taking part in the Mediterranean regatta, she was attacked by Rifians who fired upon her. A timely breeze enabled the yacht to escape.

One day last week the three year old daughter of Octave Lizette, St. Roch. Que., during the temporary absence of her mother, overturned a lamp, which exploded, set fire to the child's clothes and also to those of her eighteen months old sister. Both were burned to death.

A special from Caribou, Maine, says the worst freshet ever known here prevails, as result of melting snow in the northern part of the state. The Aroostook river, swollen to an unusual height, burst through the dam here last week, and about one-third of the structure was carried away. The entire river district is submerged and the town is without light or water. Damage estimated at \$20,000.

The Statist recently offered a prize of 10,000 guineas for the best essay on the subject of "Imperial Customs Union." The competition is ended and the prize will be divided between J. G. Colmer, acting commissioner for Canada and R. S. Ashtown. There were 136 entries, and the judges were the Marquis of Lorne and Lord Playfair.

Messrs. Francis Rhodes, Colonel Phillips and George Farror, three members of the Johannesburg reform committee have pleaded guilty of high treason, and the other members of the committee pleaded guilty to Lez majeste but without hostile intent against the independence of the Transvaal. The case was adjourned until Monday when defendants will be sentenced.

The North American prints a story to the effect that murderer H. H. Holmes has evolved a new scheme on the last desperate effort to escape the gallows. It is declared that he means to ask Mrs. Pitzel, the widow of the man for whose murder Holmes is under death sentence, to intercede for a commutation by the Board of Pardons. Knowing the woman's penniless situation, Holmes, it is asserted, had her brought here from her

The British barque Firth of Solway, bound for Dunedin, was sunk Sunday morning by collision with the British steamer Marsdon, of Greenock, near Kirsh Lightship, on the east coast of Ireland. The barque went down almost immediately and the captain's wife and child and thirteen of the crew were drowned. The captain and eight sailors were saved.

Typhoid fever has singularly stricken a man of Anderson, Ind. He had a severe attack of the fever, but completely recovered physically. His mind is strangely affected. He does not remember any one he knew previous to his illness and his family are strangers to him. He was a clever workman at his trade of glass-blowing before his illness, but has entirely forgotten all about his work. His mind is blank in these two respects, but he is entirely rational otherwise.

A man in Somerset county, Me., has arranged a highly interesting system of confusion in his family under the belief that he was simplifying the family affairs. The initials of himself, his wife, his son, and his daughter are all alike. His name is Marshall McDonald Bartlett; his wife's Maria Mallng Bartlett; his son's, Maurice Marshall Bartlett and his daughter's, Margaret Mallng Bartlett. He says there can be no secrets in the family because letters addressed to M. M. Bartlett are liable to be opened by any member with perfect safety. This is perhaps all right, but the limitless possibilities, social, legal, commercial, and various, are appalling.

There was a gas explosion Friday evening at No. 1,402 St. Catherine street Montreal, which has disfigured a man for life, and which nearly cost him his life. The building is being renovated to be occupied on the first of May as a saloon, and N. Bazinet was working in the window repairing the gas jets, when suddenly a terrible explosion occurred, and Bazinet was thrown with great force through the plate glass on to the street. He was picked up bleeding profusely, and driven to his home at No. 126 Iberville street, and a doctor was summoned. It was found that he had been terribly cut by the glass, and he will be disfigured for life. The cause of the accident is a mystery, for there were no fights in the window at the time.
